
FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK.......



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are "among the missing." Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, and so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations are. In answering the call, they keep the "sabbatical" rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship.

For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshiping together on Sundays. They responded, "Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live." By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life. —James Field, Copyright © J. GOD'S PROVIDENCE

Today's readings celebrate God's providence. No matter how wonderful (or heartbreaking) our relationships are, God always provides for us. No one cares for us the way God does.

Isaiah delights us with a deeply intimate image of God caring for us "as a mother comforts her child." The prophet describes us not as the usual "children of God," but as "babies." We should not resist this image, but rejoice in it. Trusting in God's care, we can all let down our guard and rest like infants in the lap of our mother.

Saint Paul's trust in God allows him to be at peace like this. He boldly declares that no one can "make troubles" for him, because he has given himself completely to Jesus. And when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, he challenges them not to provide for themselves, but to let faith be their guide. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Caring for the Mind, Body and Spirit

St. Peregrine Ministry

The St. Peregrine Ministry accompanies caregivers and those persons who live with serious illness, especially cancer and chronic illness and provides prayer support, resources, education and a sacred space for sharing after the *St. Peregrine Prayer Service*. The prayer services for the rest of the year are being scheduled and will appear on the church calendar soon.

As summer has officially arrived, we look forward to spending more time outdoors in the sun. Are you aware that skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States? Approximately 9,500 people in the U.S. are diagnosed with skin cancer daily. Current estimates are that one in five Americans will develop skin cancer in their lifetime. It is important to know that one blistering sunburn during childhood or adolescence can nearly double a person's chance of developing melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, later in life. Melanoma is the cause of death of nearly twenty Americans every day.

The key is to follow safe sun practices all through the year, but especially during the summer when more exposure to the sun occurs. Everyone is at risk of skin cancer – regardless of age, gender or race. Skin needs protection from the sun in order to reduce the risk of skin cancer. The following suggestions will provide protection. *Seek shade*, especially from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. when the sun's rays are the strongest. *Dress to protect yourself from the sun* by wearing a long-sleeved shirt, pants, a widebrimmed hat and sunglasses. *Apply a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen* with an SPF of 30 or higher. Remember to reapply every two hours or after swimming or sweating.

To learn more about skin cancer prevention or detection or if you have questions about how to protect your skin or choose a sunscreen, find a board-certified dermatologist at SpotSkinCancer.org.

Have fun in the sun but do not let the sun damage your skin!

Tips for a Healthy Summer

Summer is a great time to spend more time outdoors and to keep in mind ways to have a healthy summer. The *first tip is to eat a healthy diet!* Eating healthy involves eating a variety of foods to give your body the nutrients it needs to maintain your health, feel good and have energy. The nutrients that the body needs include protein, carbohydrates, fat, water, vitamins and minerals. Replace processed food with real food whenever possible – eat food as close as possible to the way that God made it!


The second tip is to *move more and sit less!* The American Heart Association suggests a minimum of thirty minutes of cardiovascular exercise five to seven days a week. Aerobic means "with oxygen" which means that breathing controls the amount of oxygen that can make it to the muscles to help them burn fuel and move. Included in the aerobic session should be warm-up time, cool-down time and stretching exercises.

The third tip is to *keep cool in extreme heat!* Stay cool – stay hydrated – stay informed. Be aware of the temperature of the day and the activity that you will be doing so that you do not put yourself at risk for heat-related injuries. Heat exhaustion occurs when the body gets too hot and may lead to heat stroke if the body temperature rises to 104 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. Heat stroke is a dangerous situation and requires emergency treatment.

The last tip is to *wear sunscreen and insect repellent*. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends wearing a broad spectrum sunscreen of at least SPF 15. As it wears off, reapply sunscreen if you are in the sun for more than two hours and after swimming, sweating or toweling off. Be sure to check the expiration date of the sunscreen. According to webMD, insect repellent products containing DEET are safe when used according to the directions. If you have questions about the use and choices of sunscreens and insect repellents, check out the Environmental Working Group website at www.ewg.org.

As with any health tips or suggestions, it is always recommended to take into consideration your health status and consult with your physician or healthcare provider to make sure that the tips (especially for nutrition and physical activity) are safe for you to follow. Wishing you a healthy and fun summer!
