THE **CPIPHANY** OF THE LORD

JANUARY 5, 2020



From The Pastor's Desk... Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!

I hope you still have your Christmas decorations up! After all, today we celebrate the Epiphany, known in many cultures as "little Christmas." Christmas celebrates the birth of the long awaited for messiah of the Jewish people. This good

news is revealed by angels to a group of shepherds abiding in the fields keeping watch over their flocks by night. Epiphany celebrates the birth of the savior of all nations. This good news is revealed by a star followed by gentile magi to the place where the child lay. When the wise men came to Herod in Jerusalem inquiring about the child whose star they had followed, the scribes Herod called together were able to explain where the messiah should be born, but they remained quite unperturbed about the news. Although they were familiar with visions like the one in today's first reading, they seemed impervious to the possibility that Isaiah's promised caravans and gift-bearing royalty had, at long last, arrived on their doorstep. For whatever reason, they did not accompany the travelers from the East on their journey to Bethlehem. Similarly, many my know the whole of Christianity but make no movement. The power that forever altered heaven and earth leaves many people completely unmoved. But what a difference! With only a rumor to go by, the visitors from the East traveled a far distance in search of One whom they thought would make a difference in the world. Obviously, that "rumor" that good news, has spread throughout the world, and today's feast attests to the universal scope of Jesus' mission and God's all-inclusive plan of Salvation. The various ways in which this feast is celebrated by believers everywhere also witnesses to the international character of the church.

One of those traditions, not too familiar in the United States is marking of the church doors with chalk, which we are doing today. Epiphany, also known as Twelfth Night, *Theophany*, or Three Kings Day marks the occasion of a time-honored Christian tradition of "chalking the doors." The formula for the ritual — adapted for 2020 — is simple: take chalk of any color and write the following above the entrance of your home: 20 + C + M + B + 20. The letters have two meanings. First, they represent the initials of the Magi — Caspar, Malchior, and Balthazar — who came to visit Jesus in His first home. They also abbreviate the Latin phrase, *Christus mansionem benedicat*: "May Christ bless the house." The "+" signs represent the cross, and the "20" at the beginning and the "20" at the end mark the year. Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes so marked and that He stay with those who dwell therein throughout the entire year.

¡Espero que todavía tengas puestas tus decoraciones de Navidad! Después de todo, hoy celebramos la Epifanía, conocida en muchas culturas como "pequeña Navidad". La Navidad celebra el nacimiento del tan esperado mesías del pueblo

judío. Los ángeles revelan esta buena noticia a un grupo de pastores que permanecen en los campos vigilando sus rebaños por la noche. La Epifanía celebra el nacimiento del salvador de todas las naciones. Esta buena noticia es revelada por una estrella seguida por los magos gentiles hasta el lugar donde vacía el niño. Cuando los hombres sabios llegaron a Herodes en Jerusalén preguntando por el niño cuya estrella habían seguido, los escribas que Herodes reunió pudieron explicar dónde debía nacer el mesías, pero no se perturbaron por las noticias. Aunque estaban familiarizados con visiones como la de la primera lectura de hoy, parecían insensibles a la posibilidad de que las prometidas caravanas y la realeza con regalos de Isaías, por fin, hubieran llegado a su puerta. Por alguna razón, no acompañaron a los viajeros del Este en su viaje a Belén. Del mismo modo, muchos conocen todo el cristianismo pero no hacen ningún movimiento. El poder que alteró para siempre el cielo y la tierra deja a muchas personas completamente impasibles. ¡Pero qué diferencia! Con solo un rumor, los visitantes del Este viajaron una gran distancia en busca de Aquel que ellos pensaron que haría una diferencia en el mundo. Obviamente, ese "rumor" de las buenas noticias se ha extendido por todo el mundo, y la fiesta de hoy atestigua el alcance universal de la misión de Jesús y el plan de Salvación integral de Dios. Las diversas formas en que los creventes celebran esta fiesta en todas partes también dan testimonio del carácter internacional de la iglesia.

Una de esas tradiciones, no muy familiar en los Estados Unidos, es marcar las puertas de la iglesia con tiza, lo que estamos haciendo hoy. La Epifanía, también conocida como la Duodécima Noche, *Teofanía*, o Día de los Tres Reyes Magos marca la ocasión de una tradición cristiana ancestral de "marcar con tiza las puertas". La fórmula del ritual, adaptada para el 2020, es simple: toma una tiza de cualquier color y escribe lo siguiente arriba de la entrada de tu hogar: 20 + C + M + B + 20.

Las letras tienen dos significados. Primero, representan las iniciales de los Magos - Caspar, Malchior y Balthazar - quienes vinieron a visitar a Jesús en Su primer hogar. También abrevian la frase latina, *Christus mansionem benedicat*: 'Que Cristo bendiga la casa.'' Los signos # "representan la cruz, y el "20" al principio y el "20" al final marcan el año. En conjunto, esta inscripción se realiza como una petición para que Cristo bendiga esos hogares tan marcados y que El se quede con los que viven allí durante todo el año.

LUZ DEL MUNDO

LIGHT OF THE WORLD

Epiphany can be understood as an extension of the Nativity of the Lord that we celebrate on December 25. While at Christmas we celebrate Jesus' coming as the long-awaited king and Messiah of the Jewish people, on Epiphany we celebrate the revelation that Jesus is the Savior and Light of all nations—Jews, Gentiles, and all people.

The star shines so brightly that it attracts magi who come from far distant countries to worship Jesus. They are not Jews, yet they are drawn to the Light of the world. The letter to the Ephesians reveals that the Light of the world was for the Gentiles as well as the Jews—Christ gathers all people into the light of his love. The reading from Isaiah also describes a gathering of diverse peoples, but this time it is to the light that emanates from the people of God. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

SAINT ELIZABETH ANN SETON (1774-1821) January 4

Though her liturgical designation is "Religious," Elizabeth Seton, her feast-day prayer reminds us, was also wife, mother, educator, foundress. Born into a wealthy Episcopalian family, Elizabeth married William Seton, whose untimely death in Italy where the young family sought healing for William's tuberculosis, left her, at twenty-nine, a widow with five children. Inspired by the faith and charity of the Italian family with whom they stayed, Elizabeth embraced Catholicism despite her family's disowning her and ceasing financial support. This woman of many firsts (and several vocations!) opened the first free Catholic school, beginning the American Catholic educational system, and founded the first American religious community for women, the Sisters of Charity. The tuberculosis that claimed her husband took also her oldest and youngest daughters and, finally, at just forty-seven, Elizabeth herself. Another first: in 1975 she was canonized the first native-born American saint. Once asked to summarize her spirituality, she replied: "Faith lifts the staggering soul on one side, hope supports it on the other, experience says it must be, and love says let it be!" —Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. 
