

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...... Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!!

Today is the First Sunday of Lent. We all know Lent as a time of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer. We know it too as a time to reflect on our sinfulness, go to confession, and do penance in preparation to celebrate Easter. While repentance is a

well-known Lenten theme, many people are surprised to learn that Baptism is just as an integral part of the season of Lent as is the sacrificing and penance. Having said that, we generally do not baptize infants during Lent (except in an emergency). During Lent, we want our focus to shift to adult baptism. Lent is the final period of preparation for adult (catechumens) for baptism at the Easter Vigil. In the coming weeks they will have a more intense preparation through the scrutiny prayers and anointing with the oil of Catechumens. The rest of us, baptized as infants, are to prepare ourselves to renew, on Easter Sunday, the promises of baptism that our parents and godparents made for us. Here are a few questions for your reflection during Lent. After water was poured over your head, you were then anointed on the head with the oil, the Chrism of salvation, as Priest, Prophet and King. How are you living that reality – that you, like Christ, are a Priest, Prophet, and King? Then you were clothed in a white garment as a sign that you have become a new creation and clothed yourself in Christ. How have you lived your Christian dignity as a person clothed in Christ? One of your godparents lit a candle from the Easter Candle, with these words: "Receive the Light of Christ." How has the light of Christ shown through you in your thoughts, actions, and words? Think about these as you prepare to climb the mountain of Lent to the glorious heights of Easter.

Our Middle School Youth Minister, Candy Rice has announced that she will be retiring (for the second time) from Our Lady of Mercy at the end of June. Candy led the EDGE program for our sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students and parents. Candy worked in that position from 2007 until retiring (the first time) in 2012. John Werle held the position from 2012 - 2017. Prior to Fr. Hugh's retirement in June 2017, he invited Candy to come back to OLM as Middle School Youth Minister, which I am glad she did! When I arrived in June 2017, it was good to have staff all in place. I want to thank Candy for the years of service she has given to the Our Lady of Mercy Parish as a staff member, a guide and friend to countless number of middle school youth, and their parents! She has always brought joy and enthusiasm to her ministry, and her love for the emerging teens was always very evident! We wish Candy every blessing in her retirement!

DESDE EL ESCRITORIO DEL PASTOR...... ¡También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!

Hoy es el Primer Domingo de Cuaresma. Todos conocemos la Cuaresma como un tiempo de ayuno, limosna y oración. También lo conocemos como un tiempo para reflexionar sobre nuestros pecados, confesarnos y hacer penitencia en preparación para celebrar la Pascua. Si bien el arrepenti-

miento es un tema Cuaresmal bien conocido, muchas personas se sorprenden al saber que el Bautismo es una parte integral de la temporada de Cuaresma como lo es el sacrificio y la penitencia. Dicho esto, generalmente no bautizamos a los bebés durante la Cuaresma (excepto en una emergencia). Durante la Cuaresma, queremos que nuestro enfoque cambie al bautismo de adultos. La Cuaresma es el período final de preparación de adultos (catecúmenos) para el bautismo en la Vigilia Pascual. En las próximas semanas ellos tendrán una preparación más intensa a través de las oraciones de escrutinio y la unción con el aceite de los Catecúmenos. El resto de nosotros, bautizados como bebés, debemos prepararnos para renovar, el domingo de Pascua, las promesas del bautismo que nuestros padres y padrinos hicieron por nosotros. Aquí están algunas preguntas para tu reflexión durante la Cuaresma. Después de verter agua sobre tu cabeza, fuiste ungido en la cabeza con el aceite, el Crisma de salvación, como Sacerdote, Profeta y Rey. ¿Cómo estás viviendo esa realidad, que tú, como Cristo, eres un Sacerdote, un Profeta y un Rey? Luego te vistieron con una prenda blanca como una señal de que te has convertido en una nueva creación y te vestiste en Cristo. ¿Cómo has vivido tu dignidad Cristiana como persona vestida de Cristo? Uno de tus padrinos encendió una vela del Cirio Pascual, con estas palabras: "Recibe la Luz de Cristo". ¿Cómo se ha mostrado la luz de Cristo a través de ti en tus pensamientos, acciones y palabras? Piensa en esto mientras te preparas para escalar la montaña de la Cuaresma a las gloriosas alturas de la Pascua.

Nuestra Ministra de Jóvenes de la Escuela Intermedia, Candy Rice, ha anunciado que se jubilará (por segunda vez) de Our Lady of Mercy (OLM) a fines de junio. Candy dirigió el programa EDGE para nuestros estudiantes y padres de sexto, séptimo y octavo grado. Candy trabajó en ese puesto desde el 2007 hasta su jubilación (la primera vez) en el 2012. TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — The man and the woman ate the fruit of the one tree that God had told them to avoid, and their shame overtook them (Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7).

Psalm — Be merciful, O Lord, for we have sinned (Psalm 51).

Second Reading — Death reigned from Adam to Moses, but now grace and life abound in Christ Jesus (Romans 5:12-19 [12, 17-19]).

Gospel — Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit and there he fasted for forty days and forty nights (Matthew 4:1-11).

Lenten Regulations

• Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent.

• All from the age of 18 years up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

• On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.

- To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is sinful.
- Lent is the principal season of penance in the Church year. Therefore, all of the faithful are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial. All Catholics are encouraged to support generously the charitable works of the whole Church, pray and perform works of charity and mercy.

• Those who are sick, pregnant, or nursing, or whose health would adversely be affected by fasting or abstinence, should not consider themselves bound by these norms.

LENTEN EXPERIENCES FOR OUR TEENS

To indeed have a virtuous Lenten experience it's necessary to know and follow The Three Pillars of Lent., Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving.

Fasting during Lent, has been a tradition for centuries. Fasting is difficult for everyone. Fasting takes a lot of effort and dedication as we offer up to Our Lord the food we're not eating. Think about this, if we follow the guidelines for adult fast during Lent we'll always be aware that it's the Season of Lent. There's no way we can forget why we're fasting. Isn't this what we want? To have Jesus on our mind every day during Lent? Maybe if we're able to stick with the fast during Lent, we'll be blessed to have Jesus stay in our mind and hearts even after Lent is over.

This week, how's your fasting going? What did you choose to give up? You didn't?? It's not too late! Christ suffered terribly on the cross for us. What can we do to show him how much we love Him in return?

Taking Care of Our Hearts

The month of February has been designated as *American Heart Month*. It is an opportunity to raise awareness about heart disease which is the leading cause of death in the United States. After many years of education about heart healthy lifestyle choices, one in four people still die of heart disease each year. In order to live a heart healthy life it is important to connect with others. Studies show that if you join with others either at home, at work, in your faith community, or online, you will have a better chance of staying motivated. Get together with your support network and make a commitment together to live a heart-healthy life!



It may seem too much to change or do. Remember that small steps can help you reach your goals. The following suggestions are areas to evaluate in your life that promote a healthy heart. Move more. It is recommended to get at least two and a half hours of physical activity each week – that is 30 minutes a day, five days a week. If you do not have 30 minutes at one time, try 10 or 15 minutes a few times a day. Also do muscle strengthening exercises at least two days a week. Eat healthy foods. A diet low in sodium and saturated fat is key for the prevention of heart disease. Follow the DASH diet, Die-

tary Approaches to Stop Hypertension as a way to decrease blood pressure which is a risk factor for heart disease. Other suggestions are to aim for a healthy weight, reduce stress and improve sleep, quit smoking and know your numbers.

Our faith community has ministries that promote the spiritual, physical and emotional health of your heart. Consider looking into the many faith formation ministries that connect with the spiritual care of your heart. Some ministries provide spiritual and physical care of the heart such as Fit Shepherds, Mary's Squad, ANEW and Walking to Jerusalem. A ministry that addresses spiritual, physical and nutritional care of the heart is Come Alive! The Open HEARTS Ministry promotes emotional and mental health and well being which relates to the care of your heart. Blood pressure screenings by volunteer health care professionals on the last weekend of the month help you track your blood pressure and is an opportunity to ask questions about your health.
