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From The Pastor's Desk...
Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!

Do you have hope? In light of the COVID -19 pandemic, the civil unrest in our country, the uncertainty of the future, add other personal difficulties and challenges, do you find it difficult to have hope? How does one develop hope? To develop hope is to cultivate

mystery. All too often, we are seduced into thinking that only the present counts. We are encouraged to believe that nothing can really be changed. We are constantly exhorted to hold that there is only one way to go – namely, the party line. We thereby become victims of despair. In such a debacle, only hope can save us. But to develop hope is to cultivate mystery.

In the first reading today the exiles in Babylon had written off the Lord. They accepted what they believed to be their fate. For them the Lord could not do anything and, if he could, he was not interested. This was the party line of ancient Near Eastern theology. The prophet Isaiah counters with a message of hope: "Cry out, do not fear! Say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God!" (Is: 40:9). But it was a hope interwoven with mystery. Their ways were not God ways. God would again speak his creative Word. To respond to that Word, however, was to give God the liberty to act as he chooses. To develop hope is to cultivate mystery.

In the gospel the disciples had begun to write Jesus off. Some were no longer walking with him. Jesus, however, responded to this situation by noting the natural agricultural process of failure and success. The mode of failure is readily explicable – the mode of success is rarely intelligible. Yet despite the obvious failures, God is at work. To hope is to let God work in his own mysterious fashion and not impose human restraints. To develop hope is to cultivate mystery.

There are countless ways in which we may develop hope and thereby cultivate mystery. Parents who refuse to calculate their children's success merely in terms of academic achievement and personality point to another standard. Career people who refuse to accept the manipulative practices of big business as the only way to go testify to another dynamism. The sick and dying who refuse to see their present pain as useless and worthless indicate another value system. All such people restore God's liberty to give as he chooses to give. All such people attest that to develop hope is to cultivate mystery.

The Eucharist communicates this as well, reflecting Jesus' anxiety before his death and communicating Jesus' acceptance of the Father's mysterious plan for him. All who share in the Eucharist confess that the paths, rocks, and thorns of Jesus' passion and death are transformed into the abundant harvest of the resurrection. The Eucharist articulates a hope, but a hope based on God's freedom to act. The Eucharist asserts that to develop hope is to cultivate mystery! Let hope and mystery be a part of your life!!

### DESDE EL ESCRITORIO DEL PASTOR.......; También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!

Tienes esperanza? A la luz de la pandemia del CO-VID-19, los disturbios civiles en nuestro país, la incertidumbre del futuro, agrega otras dificultades y desafíos personales, ¿te resulta dificil tener esperanza? ¿Cómo uno desarrolla la esperanza? Desarrollar

la esperanza es cultivar el misterio. Con demasiada frecuencia, se nos seduce para pensar que solo cuenta el presente. Se nos alienta a creer que nada se puede cambiar realmente. Se nos exhorta constantemente a sostener que solo hay un camino a seguir: concretamente, la línea del partido. De este modo nos convertimos en víctimas de la desesperación. En semejante debacle, solo la esperanza puede salvarnos. Pero desarrollar la esperanza es cultivar el misterio.

En la primera lectura de hoy, los exiliados en Babilonia habían descartado al Señor. Aceptaron lo que creían que era su destino. Para ellos, el Señor no podía hacer nada y, si podía, el no estaba interesado. Esta era la línea del partido de la antigua teología del Cercano Oriente. El profeta Isaías responde con un mensaje de esperanza: "¡Clama, no temas! Di a las ciudades de Judá: ¡A quí está tu Dios! (Is: 40: 9). Pero era una esperanza entretejida con el misterio. Sus caminos no eran los caminos de Dios. Dios volvería a hablar su Palabra creadora. Sin embargo, responder a esa Palabra era darle a Dios la libertad de actuar como él quisiera. Desarrollar la esperanza es cultivar el misterio.

En el evangelio, los discípulos habían comenzado a descartar a Jesús. Algunos ya no caminaban con él. Sin embargo, Jesús respondió a esta situación señalando el proceso agrícola natural de fracaso y éxito. El modo de fracaso es fácilmente explicable, el modo de éxito rara vez es inteligible. Sin embargo, a pesar de los fracasos obvios, Dios está trabajando. Esperar es dejar que Dios trabaje a su manera misteriosa y no imponer restricciones humanas. Desarrollar la esperanza es cultivar el misterio.

Hay innumerables formas en que podemos desarrollar la esperanza y, por lo tanto, cultivar el misterio. Los padres que se niegan a calcular el éxito de sus hijos solamente en términos de rendimiento académico y personalidad indican otro estándar. Las personas profesionales que se niegan a aceptar las prácticas manipuladoras de las grandes empresas como la única forma de testificar sobre otro dinamismo. Los enfermos y moribundos que se niegan a ver su dolor actual como inútil y sin ningún valor indican otro sistema de valores. Todas esas personas restauran la libertad de Dios para dar como él elige dar. Todas esas personas atestiguan que desarrollar la esperanza es cultivar el misterio.

La Eucaristía también lo comunica, reflejando la ansiedad de Jesús antes de su muerte y comunicando la aceptación de Jesús del misterioso plan del Padre para él. Todos los que participan en la Eucaristía confiesan que los caminos, piedras y espinas de la pasión y muerte de Jesús se transforman en la abundante cosecha de la resurrección. La Eucaristía articula una esperanza, pero una esperanza basada en la libertad de Dios para actuar. ¡La Eucaristía afirma que desarrollar la esperanza es cultivar el misterio! ¡Deja que la esperanza y el misterio sean parte de tu vida!

#### **GOD'S WORDS**

Each day we are bombarded with thousands of words. From the moment our clock radios click on in the morning, until the last moment of the day when the television is turned off or someone bids us "good-night," our life is filled with words. Some words that we hear bring news that leaves us feeling low. Some words lift our spirits. Many of the words we hear are trying to get us to buy something. Some words are hurtful. Today the Church focuses our attention on hearing the word of God. Are God's words just more of the same—part of the endless stream of words that flow into our ears each day? The challenge today is to allow God's word to inspire us in new ways so that our outlook and attitudes align themselves more closely with the heart and mind of Christ Jesus. Copyright © J. S. Here in the middle of summer, many people grow vegetable and flower gardens, or appreciate the work of others by buying produce from roadside stands and farmer's markets. All our readings today embrace one of God's smallest but most common miracles as a metaphor: the seed and its cycle, and all that it stands for. Isaiah reminds us that just as God waters the earth and cares for it so that seeds may grow, so the Word of God will come and not return to God until it has borne fruit. Psalm 65 describes the cycle of growth and personifies fields that "shout for joy." Romans has "creation groaning in labor pains" as it waits for its seed to come to fruition, redemption of the body. Similarly, Jesus teaches the crowds by using the parable of the sower and the seed.

#### TODAY'S READINGS

**First Reading** — My word will achieve the end for which it was sent (Isaiah 55:10-11).

**Psalm** — The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest (Psalm 65).

**Second Reading** — We, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan within ourselves awaiting the redemption of our bodies (Romans 8:18-23).

**Gospel** — Some seed fell on rich soil and produced fruit (Matthew 13:1-23 [1-9]).



## A Summer Saint to Share & Celebrate ~ Saint Kateri Tekawitha

Feast Day: July 14

Born: 1656

Died: April 17, 1680



Her Story ~ Kateri was born in what is now present day Auriesville, New York. Growing up, Tekawitha was the girl who didn't quite fit in. The same smallpox that invaded her village and took the lives of her parents and brother when she was four years old had left her face scarred. It also damaged her eyes. The name Tekawitha means "she who bumps into things." So although she was good at weaving and playing with her cornhusk dolls, her poor eyesight made it difficult for her to plant and impossible to play running games with other children.

As she grew older, she became more interested in her mother's Christian religion. French Jesuit missionaries traveled among the villages, teaching the people about Christ. Eventually, Tekawitha asked one of these priests to teach her and baptize her into the faith. She took the name Catherine, said in Mohawk, "Kateri." Tekawitha's interest in Christianity annoyed her uncle but it was her refusal of a marriage proposal of a young warrior in front of his family that was the last straw. Her relatives mocked her and gave her all the hardest work. Not long after this, she left the village in a daring escape with the help of two Huron warriors and traveled nearly two hundred miles to a Catholic Mohawk mission near Montreal, Canada. There, at last, Kateri fit in.

Kateria taught the children prayers and told them stories about the life of Jesus. She nursed the sick, gathered offerings for those in need, and helped the elderly with their daily chores. When her life became hard, she turned to God in prayer. Four years later, dying of an illness, she spoke her last words, "Jesus, Mary, I love you." Fifteen minutes after her death, her face was transformed, no longer scarred, but radiant, an outward sign to all who knew and loved her that she finally found her true home in heaven.

#### **Social Wellness**

July is designated as *Social Wellness Month*. It is a time to nurture relationships and build stronger ties with friends, family and other loved ones. The health benefits of having strong social networks are that people tend to live longer, respond better to stress and adversity, have healthier endocrine and cardiovascular systems and have enhanced immune systems.

Even though the coronavirus pandemic has interrupted the "normal" ways that we stay connected with one another, the following ideas are suggested to promote social connections. Plan virtual gatherings such as a remote dinner party, cook a new recipe together with family or friends and then eat the meal together or play games. If you have a favorite hobby such as woodworking, painting, scrapbooking, reading and cooking, join a virtual classroom or remote gathering that focuses on that.



Think about physical activity and while wearing a mask and staying six feet away from others, start a walking routine or participate in another activity.

Another way to promote social wellness is to get involved in activities that benefit the community. Check out any virtual or remote volunteer opportunities in the community or in the church. Take this time to write letters to elected officials on issues important to you such as racial inequality, healthcare access or affordable housing. Check to see if there are outside neighborhood events that you could assist with such as cleaning a park as you follow the safety practices of wearing a mask and staying six feet apart from others.
