

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



The theme of today's gospel is obviously detachment. We are told that a man ran up to Jesus and asked him, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus tells him to obey the commandments. The man responds that he has done that since his youth. Jesus, looking at him,

loved him, as he does us, and said to him...."You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come follow me." At that statement the man's face fell, and he went away sad, for he had many possessions. It is hard to give up those things we treasure. Our possessions sometimes possess us! And it's not only material things.....we sometimes can't let go of grudges, attitudes, silly traditions, our pettiness, etc. Jesus goes on to say how hard it is for those with wealth to enter the kingdom of God. It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich. Amazed, the disciples ask, who can be saved? Jesus tells them, and us who can't let go of our possessions, that for human beings it is impossible, but not for God. This means that if we cooperate with God's grace, we will be so overwhelmed with God's love, that it will be possible to let go of our possessions. Try it!

Today is my 40th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood....October 10, 1981. Continuing with the gospel of today, Peter says to Jesus that "We have given up everything and followed you." Jesus responds saying "Amen, I say to you, there is no one who has given up house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or lands for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not receive a hundred times more now in this present age...."

In 40 years of priesthood, I have seen this scripture passage fulfilled in my life! I give praise to God for how my life has been blessed with many parishioners in my past seven parish assignments, and now all of you at Our Lady of Mercy, who have opened your homes to me. Been there as a mother or father, brother or sister to me in times of struggles and joys! Have given me the opportunity to be a part of your family celebrations, neighborhood parties, and console you in times of sorrow. Through your laughter, tears, ups and downs, shared memories you have brought me closer to God. I only hope and pray that, despite my unworthiness, you have been brought closer to God through the power given to me in my ordination to absolve you from your sins, and to feed you with the very Body and Blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

El tema del evangelio de hoy es obviamente el desapego. Se nos dice que un hombre corrió hacia Jesús y le preguntó: "¿Qué debo hacer para heredar la vida eterna?" Jesús le dice que cumpla los mandamientos. El hombre responde que lo ha hecho desde su juventud. Jesús lo

miró con amor, como nos ama a nosotros, y le dijo... "Sólo una cosa te falta: Ve y vende lo que tienes, da el dinero a los pobres y así tendrás un tesoro en el cielo; después ven y sígueme". Ante esa declaración, el hombre se entristeció y se fue apesadumbrado, porque tenía muchos bienes. Es difícil renunciar a esas cosas que atesoramos. ¡Nuestras posesiones a veces nos poseen! Y no se trata solo de cosas materiales... a veces no podemos dejar de lado los rencores, las actitudes, las tradiciones tontas, nuestra mezquindad, etc. Jesús continúa diciendo lo difícil que es para los ricos entrar en el reino de Dios. Es más fácil para un camello pasar por el ojo de una aguja, que para un rico entrar en el Reino de Dios. Asombrados, los discípulos preguntan, ¿quién puede salvarse? Jesús les dice, y a nosotros que no podemos dejar nuestras posesiones, que es imposible para los hombres, pero no para Dios. Esto significa que si cooperamos con la gracia de Dios, estaremos tan abrumados con el amor de Dios, que será posible dejar nuestras posesiones. ¡Inténtenlo!

Hoy es mi 40[°] aniversario de ordenación sacerdotal....10 de octubre de 1981. Continuando con el evangelio de hoy, Pedro le dice a Jesús que "Nosotros lo hemos dejado todo y te hemos seguido". Jesús responde diciendo: *"Yo les aseguro, nadie que haya dejado casa, o hermanos, o hermanas, o madre, o padre, o hijos, o tierras por mí y por el evangelio, dejará de recibir el ciento por uno en esta vida...."*

En 40 años de sacerdocio, ihe visto cumplido este pasaje de las Escrituras en mi vida! Alabo a Dios por cómo mi vida ha sido bendecida con muchos feligreses en mis anteriores siete asignaciones parroquiales, y ahora todos ustedes en Our Lady of Mercy, que me han abierto sus hogares. ¡Han estado allí como madre o padre, hermano o hermana para mí en tiempos de luchas y alegrías! Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Wis 7:7-11 | Heb 4:12-13 | Mk 10:17-30 or 10:17-27

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In the Old Testament, wealth was considered a sign of God's favor. So imagine the rich young man's surprise when he approached Jesus, only to find out that he would need to sell what he had and then give to the poor in order to follow Jesus. His face fell and he walked away. His demeanor highlights the fundamental error of equating what we have, and what we do, with salvation - of relying on earthly things, rather than God, for our deepest comfort and security. In contrast, the Book of Wisdom speaks of the richness and worth of divine wisdom over that of any precious gem or gold. We understand that divine wisdom to be manifested in the person of Jesus Christ. Therefore, true wisdom means having faith in Jesus rather than in our own efforts and whatever we might have earned in our lifetime. Otherwise, we are like a camel trying to squeeze through the eye of a needle. Jesus truly offers us the only way. I like to think that the young man came around eventually. After all, as Jesus says, "all things are possible for God." As we reflect, we can ask Jesus what we need to "let go of" to turn our sights, our minds, and our lives over to God, knowing that following his will is the surest path to the Kingdom.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just a few days ago, we celebrated the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The behavior of the rich young man in today's Gospel - daring, enthusiastic, confident - brings the young Francis to mind. Born into wealth, he relished his carefree lifestyle and sought to become a knight. His dreams of glory, however, quickly became a nightmare as his comrades fell and he was imprisoned in a dank cell for a year. After his release, he fell seriously ill, and God spoke to him. Francis cast aside the trappings of wealth, choosing instead to seek God's will in all things. His example invites us to pray about our priorities: What things or attitudes get in the way of our relationship with God and one another? What is the Lord asking of us and how can we respond? How can we give witness to our belief that all things are possible with God?

ACTION Perhaps try a "consumption fast" for the next couple of weeks, purchasing only what you need – food and other necessities. Use time and energy you may have spent shopping to deepen your relationship with God and others by participating in Eucharistic adoration, going to confession, visiting an elderly relative, or contacting an old friend.

Health Topic for October

October is *Breast Cancer Awareness Month.* According to the National Breast Cancer Foundation, one in eight women will develop breast cancer in their lifetime. All women are encouraged to perform breast self-exams at least once a month. Statistics show that 40% of diagnosed breast cancers are detected by women who find a lump during self-exams. The American Cancer Society's recommendation from early detection of breast cancer for women of average risk include: ages 40-44: women should have the option to start screening with a mammogram every year; ages 45-54: women should get a mammogram every year; age 55 and older: women can change to a mammogram every year or choose to continue annual mammograms.

The National Breast Cancer Foundation recommends the following suggestions to lower one's risk of breast cancer. Stay physically active it is linked with lowering breast cancer risk. Maintain a healthy weight increased body weight and weight gain as an adult is linked with a higher risk of developing breast cancer with menopause. Do not smoke - it has shown as a higher risk of breast cancer in younger premenopausal women. Eat fruits and vegetables studies have shown that a diet high in vegetables and fruit and low in red meat, can lower the risk of breast cancer. Limit alcohol intake.

Information is also available at the National Breast Cancer Foundation, Inc. website at nationalbreastcancer.org. Knowledge and early detection is what is important to save lives!

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
