### Ghostbusters

"If there's something strange, in your neighborhood... If there's something weird, and it don't look good, who you gonna call?" A Catholic priest! Yes, though it was before my time, I'm aware of the popular '80s *Ghost Busters* theme song, if nothing else because the *real* ghostbusters nowadays are actually priests! With Halloween approaching, it may be surprising to real-

ize that Christianity has a lot to do with ghosts, ghouls, and many Americans' favorite holiday.

Prior to Judaism and Christianity, most peoples found themselves worshipping spirits, ancestors, and many gods, offering sacrifices in attempts to garner supernatural favor and blessings. Such is why divination, necromancy, sorcery and the like are frequently condemned throughout Scripture (e.g. Deut 18:9-12). The Celts were no exception. They marked the coming of winter with a festival of bonfires and divining on October 31<sup>st</sup>. Then, upon conquering much Celtic territory in the 1<sup>st</sup> century, the Romans added to this festival their own commemoration of the passing of the dead in late October. Once Christianity began to spread to the Celtic lands in the 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> centuries, chiefly with missionaries like St. Patrick, Christianity offered its influence.

Certainly, sacrifices to pagan gods and attempts to conjure up the dead are not Christian. As St. Paul warns the Corinthians, "What pagans sacrifice they offer to demons and not to God." (1 Cor 10:20) Furthermore, we know that playing with superstitions is not a wise idea: "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy." (Jn 10:10)

However, proper enculturation has been a part of the universality of Catholicism since its beginning. Whereas *syncretism* means embracing mutually exclusive ideas, *enculturation* means affirming the good in a culture and redirecting it to its proper end. In the case of Halloween, we Catholics recognize that we *can*, in a way, interact with the dead; it's called praying to the saints in heaven for help and praying for those in purgatory. Jesus unites the entire Church—on earth, in purgatory, and in heaven—in Himself, and so we celebrate these realities on All Saints and All Souls day! The eve of All Saints, the day celebrating those who are "hallowed"—holy—is October 31<sup>st</sup>. It is therefore all hallows' eve...hence, "Halloween"! The uniquely American tradition of dressing up as skeletons and ghouls so as to go trick-or-treating came with the unique mixing of French, Irish, and English traditions in America, one of which simply involved children going door -to-door to beg for prayers for deceased loved ones.

At the end of the day, dressing up your kids and sending them off to acquire your favorite candy from your neighbors is fine. We ought simply to avoid that which is contrary to our faith: superstitions, witchcraft, and the glorification of evil. Yes, ghosts and demons exist, but trust me, they're boring and only cause problems. Skipping the gory movie and dropping the visit to a fortuneteller in favor of a bonfire with hot cider seems like a reasonable trade-off to me. Plus, it'll save you *and me* from an easily avoidable visit from the only real ghostbusters!

## Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

### Caza fantasmas

ines!

"Si hay algo extraño en tu vecindario... Si hay algo raro y no se ve bueno, ¿a quién vas a llamar?" ¡Un sacerdote Católico! Sí, aunque fue antes de mi tiempo, estoy al tanto del tema de la popular canción de *Los Caza fantasmas* de los 80s, al menos porque los verdaderos caza fantasmas de hoy en día son en

realidad ¡sacerdotes! Ahora que se acerca Halloween, puede resultar sorprendente darse cuenta de que el Cristianismo tiene mucho que ver con los fantasmas, seres macabros y la festividad favorita de muchos estadounidenses.

Antes del Judaísmo y el Cristianismo, la mayoría de los pueblos adoraban a los espíritus, los antepasados y muchos dioses, ofreciendo sacrificios en un intento de obtener favores y bendiciones sobrenaturales. Es por eso que la adivinación, la necromancia, la hechicería y cosas por el estilo son frecuentemente condenadas a lo largo de las Escrituras (por ejemplo, Deut 18: 9-12). Los Celtas no fueron una excepción. Marcaron la llegada del invierno con un festival de fogatas y adivinación el 31 de octubre. Luego, al conquistar gran parte del territorio Celta en el siglo I, los Romanos agregaron a este festival su propia conmemoración del fallecimiento de los muertos a fines de octubre. Una vez que el Cristianismo comenzó a extenderse a las tierras Celtas en los siglos IV, V y VI, principalmente con misioneros como San Patricio, el Cristianismo ofreció su influencia.

Ciertamente, los sacrificios a dioses paganos y los intentos de evocar a los muertos no son Cristianos. Como advierte San Pablo a los Corintios, "Lo que los paganos sacrifican lo ofrecen a los demonios y no a Dios". (1 Cor 10:20). Además, sabemos que jugar con las supersticiones no es una buena idea: "El ladrón viene sólo para robar, matar y destruir" (Juan 10:10).

Sin embargo, la inculturación adecuada ha sido parte de la universalidad del Catolicismo desde sus inicios. Mientras que el sincretismo significa abrazar ideas mutuamente excluyentes, la inculturación significa afirmar lo bueno en una cultura y redirigirlo hacia su fin adecuado. En el caso de Halloween, los Católicos reconocemos que podemos, de alguna manera, interactuar con los muertos; se llama orar a los santos en el cielo por ayuda y orar por aquellos en el purgatorio. Jesús une a toda la Iglesia —en la tierra, en el purgatorio y en el cielo— a Sí Mismo, ¡y por eso celebramos estas realidades el día de Todos los Santos y Todas las Almas! La víspera de Todos los Santos, el día en que se celebra a los que están "hallowed" o "santificados" — santos— es el 31 de octubre. Por lo tanto, es la víspera de todos los santos... ¡de ahí, "Halloween"! La tradición Estadounidense única de disfrazarse de esqueletos y seres macabros para ir a pedir dulces llegó con la mezcla única de tradiciones Francesas, Irlandesas e Inglesas en Estados Unidos, una de las cuales simplemente involucraba a los niños que iban de puerta en puerta para mendigar por oraciones por los seres queridos fallecidos.

Àl final del día, está bien disfrazar a sus hijos y enviarlos a adquirir sus dulces favoritos de sus vecinos. Simplemente debemos evitar lo que es contrario a nuestra fe: supersticiones, brujería y la glorificación del mal. Sí, los fantasmas y los demonios existen, pero créanme, son aburridos y solo causan problemas. Omitiendo la película sangrienta y dejar de visitar a un adivino en favor de una fogata con sidra caliente me parece un intercambio razonable. Además, ¡nos salvará a ustedes y a mí de una visita fácilmente evitable de los únicos verdaderos caza fantasmas!

## Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dt 6:2-6 | Heb 7:23-28 | Mk 12:28b-34

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Oh no," was my first thought when I began reading today's Gospel – "another scribe trying to trick Jesus." But this scribe agrees with Jesus: Loving God and loving your neighbor as yourself are the greatest commandments. When the scribe explains that loving God and your neighbor are worth more than all offerings or sacrifices, Jesus recognizes that the scribe took these commandments "to heart," as Moses had taught. He doesn't just *know* the law, he *understands* it. Because he understands it, Jesus assures him that he is not far from the kingdom of God. So, how can *we* grow in our understanding of what it means to love God and love our neighbor? We do this by spending time with Scripture and "taking to heart" his words; by prayerfully reflecting on Jesus' life and giving thanks for his sacrifice for us; by drawing closer to him through the sacraments; and by asking him to help us grow in our love for God, and for one another. An authentic love for God will show itself in love of neighbor, and the more we truly love one another, the greater our love for God will grow.

### GO EVANGELIZE

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Loving our neighbors is essential if we seek to draw them to God's love. For many of us, that's much easier said than done. It's not easy to love someone with whom we disagree or are in competition with. And these days, with so much division in society, it is all too simple to assume the worst rather than the best about others with whom we interact, or see on television. Can we commit to truly seeing others as God sees them – his beloved children, made in his own image? After all, it is through Jesus and in keeping his word that we become more like him, in thought and deed: "Whoever loves me will keep my word ... and my father will love him and we will come to him." Let us pray to see our neighbors as the Lord does; and pray that we ourselves might be the kind of neighbor in whom others may see God's image! We have the opportunity to be an example of, and a witness to, a love that forgives and is not overcome by fear or division.

**PRAY** As we prepare for the feast of All Souls, make an effort to see others as God sees them by reflecting on the lives of those who have loved you and what their lives have taught you about God's love. Attend Mass and give thanks for those you hold in your heart. Then pray honestly and sincerely for those with whom you know you have a difference of conviction or opinion, asking God to graciously answer all their needs and to care for them as you yourself would like to be cared for.

### Bishop Hicks Column

I love to preach. I love it! That may sound odd to you, especially since public speaking is one of the greatest fears in the world, partly because we become anxious about looking silly and being judged or rejected. Yet, every time I approach the pulpit, I am humbled and overjoyed to break open the Word of God and try toconnect it to our daily lives.

While I am able to share my love for preachingnow, I must admit that when I entered the seminary, I thought to myself, "I am not sure how I am ever going to preach!" Not only did I wonder how I would conquer my fear and stage fright, but I also questioned, "How am I going to comeup with new and relevant material day after day?"

Thankfully at the seminary, my homiletics' teacher was wise, brilliantly creative and humble. He encouraged me and my fellow seminarians to find our own voice. He gently helped us to develop our own authentic style instead of trying to pretend to be someone we were not.

Admittedly, my confidence has grown over the years. Yet there still remains the daily task of thinking of what to say. People have noticed over the years that when someone is telling a story in normalconversation, I will often say, "Now, that would makea good homily!" I am constantly listening to others and their experiences, keeping track of how I might share them in my preaching one day. In other words, I keep my eyes and ears open to the world aroundme and then try to connect those examples to Scripture and the spiritual life.

Before preaching, I also use the ancient tradition of "lectio divina" which Pope Benedict XVI referred to as "prayerful listening to the Word of God." Basically, this four-step process of praying over Scripture includes: 1) Reading (lectio) 2) Meditation (meditatio) 3) Prayer (oratio) 4) Contemplation (contemplatio). The process allows me to move beyond myself and my own interpretation by encountering God, who is behind, in and beyond the text.

In other words, by using lectio divina, I try to avoidpreaching about the "Gospel according to me" and instead break open the Scriptures according to the "Word of the Lord."

I remember this past Advent season, I started thinking about my Christmas homily. I wanted to share something fresh and relevant as the new bishop of Joliet. Yet, with all my reading, conversations and prayer, I was dry. Nothing! I started to think to myself, "Maybe I will just have todust off a homily from a Christmas past?" Then, two days before Christmas Eve, I was doing my morning Holy Hour before the Blessed Sacrament and I said to Jesus, "I have nothing to preach about on Christmas. Please help me." My prayer was answered almost instantly. Within two minutes of my asking the Lord for his help, he sent the Holy Spirit to meand deposited in my head a homily from beginning to end, which I joyfully preached two days later at our Cathedral of St. Raymond Nonnatus.

Please know that most of my prayer petitions are not answered

so quickly or so precisely. But I wanted to share that personal experience with you to remind all of us that Jesus is real and that God wants the best for us. He truly knows and loves usand wants us to know and love Him.

While I always try to preach well, I am aware of my own shortcomings and regret the times that I was not as good as I would have liked to have been or when Igave less than what the people of God deserve. I thinkmost of us desire good preaching and long to be fed by the Word of God. I wholeheartedly agree with PopeFrancis, who said, "The homily can actually be an intense and happy experience of the Spirit, a consoling encounter with God's word, a constant source of renewal and growth." (Evangelii Gaudium, 135)

One last thought ... remember that we all preach. Most preaching does not come from a pulpit at Mass. Instead, we communicate much by our daily words, attitudes and actions. By raising our minds and hearts in prayer to God, let us all strive to preach well and follow the wise words of St. Teresa of Avila, "We must all try to be preachers through our deeds."

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
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
