Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Today is Gaudete Sunday. We rejoice that our Savior has come and will come again! We are called to be a people of joy. "Shout for joy." "Sing joyfully." "Be glad and exalt with all your heart." These are the words of Zephaniah in our first read-

ing. "Rejoice!" I shall say it again, rejoice!" Paul adds helpfully, in case we haven't gotten the picture yet.

There is another reason to rejoice today as well. Today is the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. However, because the feast falls on a Sunday, the Sunday takes precedence over the feast, so our Scripture readings and Mass prayers today are for the Third Sunday of Advent.

Every year, tens of thousands of pilgrims journey to the capital of Mexico in humble supplication before this heavenly image, miraculously imprinted on the cloak of Juan Diego in 1531. Nearly 500 years later, the tilma – made of the fiber of coarse-woven cactus, which would normally decompose after two decades still evades corruption. The colors remain vibrant and the image captivating. What do we see when we look at this image? There is a woman in indigenous dress. Her head is bowed, her eyes cast downward toward us. She wears a mantle over her head and shoulders, and it is of deep turquoise – the color of royalty. Her robe is lined with gold and studded with stars, a symbol of the heavens. The woman is with child. She stands upon a crescent moon in front of the sun, reminiscent of the Lady in the book of Revelation whose child was "destined to rule all the nations with an iron rod." At Tepeyac, she speaks to Juan Diego in his native tongue, saying: "I am the ever Virgin Mary, Mother of the True, living God." When later asked to identify the woman, Juan Diego explained in his Aztecan dialect that she was "Te Coatlazopeuh" she who crushes the serpent.

Archbishop Jose Gomez has said, "The Church in this country, and every one of us, has the responsibility to continue the task that the Virgin gave to St. Juan Diego to "build a shrine" with our lives. To build a society that glorifies God and is worthy of the dignity of the human person." The image of Our Lady of Guadalupe – Patroness of the Americas, Star of the New Evangelization, and the Protector of the Unborn – is a presence of hope, a light in the darkness, calling us to build a civilization of love and freedom here in the Americas.

To our OLM Hispanic Community and all of us, happy feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe!

Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

¡También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Hoy es domingo de Gaudete. ¡Nos regocijamos que nuestro Salvador ha venido y volverá de nuevo! Estamos llamados a ser un pueblo de alegría. "Griten de alegría." "Canten con alegría". "Alégrense y exáltense con todo su corazón". Estas son las palabras de Sofonías en nuestra primera lectura.

"¡Alégrense lo diré de nuevo, alégrense!" Pablo agrega amablemente, en caso de que aún no nos hemos enterado.

También hay otra razón para alegrarnos hoy día. Hoy es la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe. Sin embargo, debido a que la fiesta cae en domingo, el domingo tiene prioridad sobre la fiesta, por lo que nuestras lecturas de las Escrituras y las oraciones de la Misa de hoy son para el Tercer Domingo de Adviento.

Cada año, decenas de miles de peregrinos viajan a la capital de México en humilde súplica ante esta imagen celestial, impresa milagrosamente en el manto de Juan Diego en 1531. Casi 500 años después, la tilma, hecha de fibra de cactus, de tejido áspero, que normalmente se descompondría después de dos décadas, aún evade la corrupción. Los colores siguen siendo vibrantes y la imagen cautivadora. ¿Qué vemos cuando miramos esta imagen? Hay una mujer vestida de indígena. Su cabeza está inclinada, sus ojos miran hacia nosotros. Lleva un manto sobre la cabeza y los hombros, y es de un turguesa profundo, el color de la realeza. Su manto está bordeado con oro y tachonado de estrellas, un símbolo de los cielos. La mujer está embarazada. Ella está de pie sobre una luna creciente frente al sol, que recuerda a la Señora del libro del Apocalipsis, cuyo hijo estaba "destinado a gobernar todas las naciones con vara de hierro". En el Tepeyac, le habla a Juan Diego en su lengua materna y le dice: "Yo soy la siempre Virgen María, Madre del Verdadero Dios vivo". Cuando más tarde se le pidió que identificara a la mujer, Juan Diego explicó en su dialecto Azteca que ella era "Te Coatlazopeuh", la que aplasta a la serpiente.

El arzobispo José Gómez ha dicho: "La Iglesia en este país, y cada uno de nosotros, tiene la responsabilidad de continuar la tarea que la Virgen le dio a San Juan Diego de "construir un santuario" con nuestras vidas. Construir una sociedad que glorifique a Dios y sea merecedora de la dignidad de la persona humana". La imagen de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe - Patrona de las Américas, Estrella de la Nueva Evangelización y Protectora de los No Nacidos - es una presencia de esperanza, una luz en la oscuridad, que nos llama a construir una civilización de amor y libertad aquí en las Américas.

Para nuestra Comunidad Hispana de OLM y para todos nosotros, jfeliz día de la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe!

Third Sunday of Advent

Zep 3:14-18a | Phil 4:4-7 | Lk 3:10-18

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Although spontaneous outbursts of joy are not part of our liturgy, today's readings alert us that we have much reason to rejoice. Even in times of anxiety, we can rely on the words of St. Paul, who writes that we can rest assured that "the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard [our] hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." As we prepare for his coming during this Advent season, we don't need to leap out of our pews and make a show of our praise (but go for it, if that's your style!). However, in our hearts and in our prayer, we can follow the psalmist's lead and "cry out with joy and gladness: for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel." We can praise God in many ways, through fervent prayer, simple acts of kindness and, as John the Baptist did so well, sharing the Good News.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

"What should we do?" The crowds asked John the Baptist a deceptively simple question many of us wrestle with today. How do we prepare for Christ's coming? How should we spend the next hour, the day, the next year, the next five? John the Baptist answers without reservation: Share what you have. Don't be greedy. Do not falsely accuse others. In other words, get it together! The Lord is coming. Advent is a wonderful time to do just that, and St. Paul reminds us that we don't have to know all the answers. "The Lord is near," he writes, "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God." Last week, the readings encouraged us to discern what is truly valuable in our lives as Christians. Today's readings encourage us to ask the Lord: "What should we do?" Just as John the Baptist showed the people how to prepare for Christ's coming, the Lord shows us how to live out and share our faith through the Scriptures and in the silence of prayer.

ACTIONS Remember the last time you felt unadulterated joy? For me it was when my son smacked a game-winning goal at a hockey game. As we move through Advent, we can reawaken a sense of childlike joy as we prepare to celebrate Christ among us. As you light the Advent candle, take time to share with one another something that gave you joy within the past week.

Pink or rose is a liturgical color for joy. The Third Sunday of Advent or Gaudette Sunday reminds us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Christ. May we spread the joy that we have in our hearts because of our relationship with Jesus to all the world today!

You may want to keep the memory of your loved one alive through a memorial fund, a scholarship or making a donation to a charity. If it is comfortable, talk about your loved one with others to share memories. Prepare for special days such as anniversary dates, birthdays, and holidays that will be more difficult to handle without your loved one. Reach out for professional grief counseling or a bereavement support group.

December 2021 **Our Lady of Guadalupe**

The Virgin Mary is known by many titles in the Catholic Church. They represent her universal love and compassion to all her children. One of her beautiful and powerful titles is Our Lady of Guadalupe. Some may assume that because of this title, her appeal is limited to only Mexicans, since she appeared to St. Juan Diego at the hill of Tepevac in Mexico in December of 1531.

However, since her apparitions, she has converted millions of people worldwide to her son, Jesus. For this reason, St. John Paul II proclaimed that she is not only the queen of Mexico, but formally declared her as the patroness of the Americas. In other words, as Pope Francis said, "She shares all the joys and hopes, the sorrows and troubles of God's People, which is made up of men and women of every race and nation."

As we are quickly approaching the quincentennial year of her appearances, her message continues to be more relevant than ever for all people. In a world filled with division, violence, murder, atheism, spiritual apathy and distrust, Our Lady of Guadalupe urgently desires us to know and love her son. Jesus. For it is through Jesus that we find true unity, peace and salvation.

As a priest, I led many trips of parishioners to visit a home for orphaned and abandoned children in Morelos, Mexico. As we toured the dormito-

ries and classrooms, most would no-Bishop Hicks' Column tice that there was a picture, candle or statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe in almost every room. I would share with the group that Guadalupe had a special place in the hearts of these children because they looked to her not only as the Mother of God, but also as their own mother. They took real comfort in knowing that even though they were no longer with their biological parents, she is their mother. Her presence beautifully reminds them that they are not alone or forgotten; instead, they are loved. She shares with them and us the same powerful words that she shared with St. Juan Diego, "Do not be afraid, am I not here, your Mother?"

> As an added bonus to the trip to the orphanage, we would also spend a day in pilgrimage to the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. On most of our visits, we would begin by exiting the bus and making a human chain, holding each other's hands so that we would not get separated in the vast crowds. My group would always be impressed with the level of faith and devotion they witnessed as many people approached their penitential journey to Our Lady on their knees and in deep prayer. Once inside the basilica, we would celebrate Mass and pray the rosary together in one of the many side chapels. No one ever had a doubt that we were on holy ground.

> After Mass and the purchase of some religious souvenirs and gifts, it would be time to conclude our visit by walking behind the main altar and view upclose the tilma of St. Juan Diego. It is the actual cloth that bears Our Lady of Guada

lupe's beautiful image. On one of the visits, as we were walking back to our bus, one parishioner asked me, "Does the real tilma from 1531 still exist?" I replied, "Yes! We just looked at it behind the altar!" With shock and surprise, she raised her voice and exclaimed, "THAT was the real tilma? It's not a copy?" | assured her that it was the original, one and only, tilma. With that, she said, "I have to go back and see her again." Without hesitation, the whole group agreed to turn around and get another glimpse of the tilma bearing the image of the patroness of the Americas, Our Lady of Guadalupe.

When we realize and are convinced that Mary our mother is real, and she truly wants us to know and love her son, then our hearts, on fire, are naturally drawn to her. We feel a deep longing to see her, to talk with herand to celebrate her.

This year, as we return to this special feast day on Dec. 12, may Our Lady of Guadalupe continue to draw all her children close to her and to follow the Gospel of life and light of her son, Jesus. Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, pray for us.



Join the diocesan mission trip to the Navajo Nation in June

The Diocese of Joliet will resume its U.S. mission program in June with a two-week trip to the Navajo Nation located near Chinle, Arizona.

The June 4-17 trip will focus on construction projects for residents of the reservation, with volunteers helping with such jobs as framing a house, tearing down dilapidated buildings, repairing fencing, etc.

"It's not just going to work for the people, but to be with them and experience their life and culture," said diocesan missions coordinator Bruce Carlson.

The diocese has organized mission trips to the reservation since 2002, but paused the annual expeditions during the past two years because of the ongoing coronavirus pandemic.

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
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
