From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Today we meet the true disciple! Why, out of all the women since the beginning of time, did God choose Mary to be the recipient of his most intimate of gifts? What was it about her that made her so appealing? We usually re-

fer to Mary as being "full of grace." But the Greek word that Luke used literally means "favored to the greatest possible degree." It was the strongest word Luke could use to show how much God loved Mary and prepared her. But why her? What was it about this young girl that so attracted and enticed God? Something about this simple, teenager made God so excited he had to make contact. And so God sent his messenger, Gabriel, to announce to her the "good news of great joy." Perhaps it's because Mary was an exemplar of faith, a prototype. She was a "being" person rather than a "doing" one. She was a "who-l-am" rather than a "what-l-do" type. She was a listener rather than a noisemaker.

The most admired American profile is just the opposite. We like the classic go-getter; the overachiever. Doers get applause. "Being" people don't. Consequently, we emphasize success and achievement. If fact, with the advent of social media, we're almost addicted now to telling it all on Facebook and LinkedIn and Instagram and Twitter. Look at me! See what I've done! Check out my profile! Oooh and ahhh over my status. Wow over my next picture! That wasn't Mary. She embraced simplicity. She experienced deep joy through being alone with the Lord in meditation. She was a contemplative. Be present. Be open. Be available. Be receptive. Be quiet. That's the kind of person Mary was.

Advent beckons to us all. It tells us to call a time-out on the field, find some quiet, and allow the word "reflect" to replace the demand to "get busy." The Gospel of Luke recommends that we especially reflect on the person of Mary – the archetypal Christian, the summation of what the word "disciple" truly means – a listener.

¡Hoy conocemos al verdadero discípulo! ¿Por qué, de todas las mujeres desde el principio de los tiempos, Dios eligió a María para ser la receptora de sus dones más íntimos? ¿Qué tenía ella que la hacía tan atravente? Por lo general, nos referimos a María como "llena

de gracia". Pero la palabra griega que Lucas usó literalmente significa "favorecida en la mayor medida posible". Fue la palabra más fuerte que Lucas pudo usar para mostrar cuánto amaba Dios a María y la había preparado. ¿Pero por qué ella? ¿Qué tenía esta joven que atraía y seducía tanto a Dios? Algo acerca de esta simple adolescente hizo que Dios se emocionara tanto que tuvo que hacer contacto. Entonces Dios envió a su mensajero, Gabriel, para anunciarle a ella las "buenas nuevas de gran gozo". Quizás sea porque María fue un ejemplo de fe, un prototipo. Ella era una persona de "ser" más que de "hacer". Ella era del tipo "quiénsoy" en lugar de "qué-hago". Ella era más una oyente que una ruidosa.

El perfil estadounidense más admirado es todo lo contrario. Nos gusta el clásico ambicioso, el sobresaliente. Los realizadores reciben aplausos. "Ser" lo que la gente no lo hace. En consecuencia, enfatizamos el éxito y los logros. Si es así, con la llegada de las redes sociales, ahora somos casi adictos a contarlo todo en Facebook, LinkedIn, Instagram y Twitter. ¡Mírame! ¡Mira lo que he hecho! ¡Revisa mi perfil! Oooh y ahhh sobre mi estado. ¡Guau con mi próxima foto! Esa no era María. Ella abrazó la simplicidad. Experimentó un gozo profundo al estar a solas con el Señor en meditación. Ella era contemplativa. Estar presente. Estar abierta. Estar disponible. Estar receptiva. Estar tranquila. Ese es el tipo de persona que era María.

El Adviento nos llama a todos. Nos dice que pidamos un descanso en el campo de juego, que encontremos algo de silencio y que permitamos que la palabra "reflexionar" reemplace la demanda de "estar ocupados". El Evangelio de Lucas recomienda que reflexionemos especialmente sobre la persona de María, la Cristiana arquetípica, la suma de lo que realmente significa la palabra "discípulo": un oyente.



Fourth Sunday of Advent

Mi 5:1-4 | Heb 10:5-10 | Lk 1:39-45

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me

one who is to be ruler in Israel;"

We do not have to go see the most recent superhero movie or binge-watch a streaming TV series that celebrates the underdog to feel the elation that comes with overcoming evil. We need only to look at our own lives, and God's plan of salvation for us, to understand what it truly means to be triumphant. From tiny little Bethlehem - a town of no consequence - would arise the Savior of the world. He would be the One who came to do God's will, and thus consecrated us to God through the offering of his own body as sacrifice, once for all. This is the One Mary carried in her womb and whom Elizabeth's unborn child - we know to be John the Baptist - recognized. He is the child-most-vulnerable who would become King of the Universe, "stand[ing] firm and shepherd[ing] his flock by the strength of the Lord." This is the God we serve: the One who became like us so that we may one day be like him. We shall soon celebrate the anniversary of his birth, while also waiting in joyful hope for his coming again. In this time of preparation, then, we pray for the grace to know the Lord more fully and to appreciate with gratitude the Savior he truly is.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas, now is the time many of us will begin to gather – as families, friends, and faith communities. What an ideal opportunity to renew our relationships with one another and with Jesus, asking the Holy Spirit to help us recognize the presence of God in our lives and in others. Micah's prophesy from today's first reading endures: "His greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth; he shall be peace." Let's do our part to share the peace and joy of Christ with those we encounter, witnessing to his saving grace in our lives, and offering others an opportunity to be a part of the greatest story, ever – of God's saving action.

INVITE/PRAY Invite visiting family members to your parish or faith community for a concert, worship or other Advent activity. If that's not possible, pray the O Antiphons together at home.

Pastoral Care

Fourth Sunday of Advent

As you light the fourth candle on your Advent wreath, the purple candle is lit that represents Peace. It is called the "Angel's Candle" as a reminder of the message of the angels. "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men." There is less than a week until Christmas. Take the remaining days of Advent to let go of whatever is in the way of truly being open to the Advent blessings that God wants to give to you. Open your hands, eyes, ears, senses and all of your heart to God. May you be filled with peace, joy, faith and hope - prepared for the celebration of the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day!

Coping with Grief during the Holidays

While society may be encouraging you to join in the celebration of the holiday season, for you the holiday sounds, sights and smells may trigger memories of your loved one who has passed away. The following suggestions are offered by Dr. Alan Wolfelt to help you cope with your grief during this time of the year.

Talk about your grief. Find caring family and friends who will listen, help you feel understood and will not judge you. Be tolerant of your physical and psychological limits. Remember that grief drains you – you may have low energy and fatigue. Listen to your body and lower your own expectations. Eliminate unnecessary stress. Find a balance between having time for yourself and being with others. Do not overextend yourself or do too much which may increase your stress. Be with supportive, comforting people. Spend your time with those who will allow you to talk openly about your feelings and accept them – both happy and sad. Talk about your loved one who has passed away. It is important to be able to talk about the person who was and

in a different way still is an important part of your life. Do what is right for you during the holidays. Focus on what you want to do, talk it over with a trusted friend and share them with your family and friends. Plan ahead for family gatherings. Decide what family traditions you want to continue, those you want to change or new ones that you want to start. Know that even though you plan ahead, you may want to change them. Embrace your memories made in love with your loved one in the past. Spend time thinking about the meaning and purpose of your life and recognize the positive things in life that surround you. Turn to your faith for comfort and support.

Dr. Alan Wolfelt reminds us that "Grief is both a necessity and a privilege. It comes as a result of giving and receiving love. Don't let anyone take your grief away. Love yourself. Be patient with yourself. And allow yourself to be surrounded by loving, caring people."

COVID-19 Guidelines in Celebrating the Holidays

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) offers the following safe ways to celebrate the holidays. Wear well-fitting masks over the nose and mouth in public indoor settings if you are not fully vaccinated. Where are Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Masses this year? And at what times?

Our Lady of Mercy will celebrate Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Mass in-person with the following Mass times.

- Friday 12/24 @ 3pm **both** in the Church and Parish Life Center PLC and at 5PM, 7PM and Midnight in the Church.
- Saturday 12/25 @ 8am, 10am, and 12pm (there will be no 4pm Mass) in the Church.

Which Christmas Masses will be livestreamed?

Christmas Eve Midnight Mass & Christmas Day 10am Masses will be livestreamed at <u>olmercy.com</u>, <u>YouTube</u>, and <u>Facebook</u>!

• Mass in the Parking Lot with reception of Holy Communion will be available at the Christmas Day 10am Mass (only).

Will I need to make a reservation for any of the Christmas Mass times? Will reservations be available?

 Reservations will NOT be offered or needed for Christmas Eve Masses. Seating will be offered on a firstcome-first-served basis.

How many seats will there be for each Mass?

• We will have the Church (and Parish Life Center at the 3pm Christmas Eve Mass) open in person. No matter where you're located, you'll be able to see, hear and participate fully in the Mass experience.

Will the annual concert before Midnight Mass take place?

Most definitely! This year's Christmas Concert is called "The Road to Bethlehem" by Lloyd Larson. The concert will start at 11:15pm with a mini chamber ensemble, string quartet, percussions, trumpet, and the Our Lady of Mercy choir. This concert experience accompanies us in the anticipation of the coming of the Messiah and the remarkable possibilities that can occur in seemingly unremarkable places.

Invite Others

A church building can be an intimidating place to enter for the first time, but you can be the vessel in bringing the Good News to people by a simple invitation. Even in this season, God is on the move, and we get to be a part of what He's doing. You can help share the Good News of Jesus by inviting others to our Christmas Masses. Sometimes a simple invitation can be helpful to someone you may not even know is struggling. Here are some ideas to get you started!

Synod on Synodality

Let us be in prayer for Bishop Hicks and all the Bishops, for blessings upon the preparation for the Synod of Bishops, and that the dialogue of those participating in the pre-synod process will bear great fruit for the salvation of souls.

Bishop Hicks and the Diocese of Joliet hosted our inaugural Mass, initiating the *diocesan phase*, on October 17, 2021. The next phase of the synod will take place at the *continental level* in 2022, and finally it will end at the *universal level* in Rome in 2023.

Pope Francis' hope, in line with his emphasis on the Church being intrinsically synodal, is to invite the world (believers, non-believers, the marginalized, the poor, etc.) to participate and talk about how the Church is living out its communion, participation and mission. The diocesan phase consists of each diocesan Church hosting "listening sessions" for its people. In the Diocese of Joliet, we are attempting to set these up through the various councils and already established ministries. For the parishes, Bishop Hicks has asked his Diocesan Pastoral Council to coordinate a dialogue through their network of deanery gatherings of parish council representatives.

Parish listening sessions may take many forms – surveys, meetings, large group gatherings, phone or door-to-door campaigns - and we are especially encouraging the use of social media and other technological means. The goal is to cast the net far and wide to hear from as many people as possible. Parishes are welcome to organize these listening sessions as they see fit.

The guiding principles proposed for this dialogue suggest that we do the following:

- 1. Speak boldly (even in our differences)
- 2. Listen in dialogue
- 3. Discern the truth

It is important to remember that the point of this process is the dialogue itself, rather than any consensus or written conclusions. Perhaps your discussion will inspire the formation of a new ministry or a new approach to existing ministry. In some cases, these conversations may inspire a new way of thinking, act as an opportunity to hear new voices, or invite further discussion that extends far beyond the synod.

Fr. Don and Fr. James **DO NOT** send texts or emails asking for money or gift cards. If you receive a message appearing to be from Fr. Don or Fr. James, please discard it and **DO NOT SEND ANY ELECTRONIC MONETARY AID.**

Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
