

## From The Pastor's Desk...

#### Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



The word "family" may be a hot button word for many of you, especially following on the heels of Christmas when family experiences can be wonderful or barely tolerable. We may have different feelings about our own families and families in general. And for many, what we celebrate today, the Holy Family, may be

romanticized or seem totally unrelated to real world families. But today's readings have insights, no matter what our own experiences of family may be.

In all of these readings, families are shaped by their faith, culture and traditions. In the first reading, Hannah, at the Temple, dedicated and gave over her only son, who would have a crucial role, unknown to her, in Israel's history. Mary and Joseph followed the Jewish tradition of the Passover pilgrimage to Jerusalem when they lost Jesus. And the advice given to community members and their families regarding how to live together, as found in Paul's writing to the Colossians, is shaped by the faith and experience of the earliest Christians. The cultures, traditions and social norms in these readings are different from ours, but there are similarities here that we can relate to and learn from.

It is no surprise that parents ultimately must let go of their children. The story of Hannah's offering is framed by religious practices of the period and was required by tradition. Samuel would become both prophet and king related to the linage of King David. The significance of Hannah's action for Israel's future was understood by later generations. One gesture in one small family had a lasting impact only time would reveal. As parents are well aware, the outcomes of their sacrifices are usually known only in hindsight. Risks are taken on faith – sometimes they exceed a family's wildest hopes and dreams. Jesus' spreading his wings probably came sooner than expected and brought with it both confusion and consternation. Mary and Joseph were not any better prepared than most parents are for the challenges of parenting. In some ways, they did not understand their child any better than most parents. What Jesus was experiencing and where he was led was probably not what they would have wanted for their son. We don't know what future our children are called to, and we let them go with no small amount of faith, pain and trust that things will work out.

The church reminds us how basic our family units are both for the church itself and for society. Families have far more influence on how the world is shaped than we may realize. Inspired by those families gone before us, we are all called to participate in the building of the human family. This feast of the Holy Family is the feast of our own holy families — and therefore a feast to be celebrated in our own holy communities.

## Desde el Excritorio Del Pastor

#### ¡También conocido como Chardonnay W(h)ines!

La palabra "familia" puede ser una palabra candente para muchos de



ustedes, especialmente después de la Navidad, cuando las experiencias familiares pueden ser maravillosas o apenas tolerables. Es posible que tengamos diferentes sentimientos sobre nuestras propias familias y familias en general. Y para muchos, lo que celebramos hoy, la Sagrada Familia, puede ser idealizada

o parecer totalmente ajena a las familias del mundo real. Pero las lecturas de hoy tienen perspicacias, sin importar cuáles sean nuestras propias experiencias con la familia.


En todas estas lecturas, las familias son moldeadas por su fe, cultura y tradiciones. En la primera lectura, Ana, en el Templo, dedicó y entregó a su único hijo, que tendría un papel crucial, desconocido para ella, en la historia de Israel. María y José siguieron la tradición judía de la peregrinación Pascual a Jerusalén cuando perdieron a Jesús. Y el consejo dado a los miembros de la comunidad y sus familias sobre cómo vivir juntos, como se encuentra en el escrito de Pablo a los Colosenses, está moldeado por la fe y la experiencia de los primeros Cristianos. Las culturas, tradiciones y normas sociales en estas lecturas son diferentes a las nuestras, pero hay similitudes aquí con las que podemos relacionarnos y aprender.

No es de extrañar que, en última instancia, los padres deban soltar a sus hijos. La historia de la ofrenda de Ana está enmarcada por las prácticas religiosas de la época y fue requerida por la tradición. Samuel se convertiría tanto en profeta como en rey relacionado con el linaje del rey David. Las generaciones posteriores comprendieron la importancia de la acción de Ana para el futuro de Israel. Un gesto en una pequeña familia tuvo un impacto duradero que solo el tiempo revelaría. Como bien saben los padres, los resultados de sus sacrificios generalmente se conocen solo en retrospectiva. Los riesgos se asumen por fe; a veces superan las esperanzas y los sueños más descabellados de una familia. El hecho de que Jesús extendiera sus alas probablemente llegó antes de lo esperado y trajo consigo confusión y consternación. María y José no estaban mejor preparados que la mayoría de los padres para los desafíos de la paternidad. De alguna manera, no entendían a su hijo mejor que la mayoría de los padres. Lo que Jesús estaba experimentando y adónde fue llevado probablemente no era lo que ellos hubieran querido para su hijo. No sabemos a qué futuro están llamados nuestros hijos, y los dejamos ir con una gran cantidad de fe, dolor y confianza en que las cosas saldrán bien.

La iglesia nos recuerda cuán básicas son nuestras unidades familiares tanto para la iglesia misma como para la sociedad. Las familias tienen mucha más influencia en la forma en que se configura el mundo de lo que creemos. Inspirados por las familias que nos precedieron, todos estamos llamados a participar en la construcción de la familia humana. Esta fiesta de la Sagrada Familia es la fiesta de nuestras propias santas familias y, por lo tanto, una fiesta que debe celebrarse en nuestras propias santas comuni-

# Feast of the Holy Family

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Some of my fondest childhood memories are of my dad leading my three sisters and me in song as we made the hour-long drive to visit my grand-parents every other weekend. Granted, our silly car songs don't qualify as "singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs," as Paul advised the Colossians, but I do think they reveal that my dad took to heart Paul's advice about family and faith. Paul writes that in putting on holiness, kindness, gentleness, and forgiving one another, we "put on love, that is, the bond of perfection." Whatever we do, in word or deed, we ought to do in the name of the Lord Jesus. Fathers, mothers, and children are to love one another, seeking and choosing the good for one another, and helping each other along life's journey – on long car trips as well as in a lifetime of situations. On this feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we honor their perfect holiness and love, and pray that God may continue to perfect us in holiness and love within our own families, that we may bear good fruit for the Kingdom.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Three Days? Mary and Joseph couldn't find Jesus for three days! Any parent who has had a child missing for a few seconds understands the anxiety Mary and Joseph experienced in three long days of searching for Jesus. In the end, though, all is well – they find him, and the peace of Christ casts out their fears. It is a remarkable scene: Jesus' parents are astonished to see him teaching in the temple, and Jesus is curious as to why they were looking for him – did they not know where he would be? This event marks a sort of milestone in their lives together, as Jesus has hinted at his future public ministry, and his parents have experienced that first bit of soul-piercing that Mary will later fully undergo. For each of them, love is what directed their actions. Joseph and Mary put aside everything to search for their son; Jesus put aside everything to serve his Father; and they joined together in humble obedience to God's will for them. The Holy Family models a way of living for us to imitate, and to witness to others in that imitation.

SERVE/STUDY Perhaps you have some down time in this coming week between Christmas and New Year's. As a family, choose an activity that allows you to think outside yourselves and serve others. Or make a plan to read the Scripture for each day of the upcoming week; everyone can choose a favorite verse to memorize each day. You may be surprised how often these verses enter your mind throughout the week.

## Pastoral Care

#### A Christmas Gift of Presence

Christmas is a time to reflect on what the gift of presence (not presents) means. God gave the gift of himself, the gift of his presence in the person of Jesus Christ. As followers of Jesus, we are called to accept and appreciate the gift of God's presence in our lives. This means developing a relationship with Jesus, staying close to Him during our lives and telling others about Jesus.

The Lord calls us to give the gift of our presence to others. Our presence is the best gift that we can give to people. It is a gift that can only be given in the way that we can give it. When we are with others, the gift of presence involves active listening and giving our full, undivided attention. It may mean putting the cell phone away, sitting still, not looking to see what time it is and listening more, talking less. It is living in the moment, not in the past or the future. It is being intentional. Giving someone our presence may provide healing. The gift of presence involves being fully awake and impacting the moment. The gift of presence does not come in a box and it cannot be opened – it just is.

This Christmas as we enter a new year, reflect on how you are living your life. Are you aware of the presence of the Divine within you whether you are being the gift of presence for someone else or being offered the gift of presence from someone else? As we navigate our lives through the challenges of the pandemic, we find that things that once were a priority have changed. Think about ways that you may be a gift of presence to others especially to those who are lonely and isolated. Let's remember that the best gift of presence for all of us will be found in the manger on Christmas our Lord, Jesus Christ!

#### SYNOD 2021-2023 LISTENING SESSIONS AT OUR LADY OF MERCY



On October 10, 2021, Pope Francis formally opened the worldwide Synod and invited all the faithful to give their feedback and views on the future of the Church through a local consultation process, which culminates with the Synod of Bishops 2023. This gathering of input at the parish/diocesan level, is underway and will run through April 2022. The theme for the synod is "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission". The Synod "is intended to inspire people to dream about the Church we are called to be, to make people's hopes flourish, to stimulate trust, to bind up wounds, to weave new and deeper relationships, to learn from one another, to build bridges, to enlighten minds, warm hearts, and restore strength to our hands for our common mission." We are called to reflect on our life and mission through prayer, listening and discernment and be guided by the Holy Spirit to better impact the world and increase our ability to encounter Christ.

Our Lady of Mercy Church invites and encourages all parishioners to participate in the synod process in one of the following 3 ways:

- (1) by attending an in-person listening session in February 2022 to be held at the PLC;
- (2) by submitting your feedback digitally on an online form; or
- (3) by filling out a printed questionnaire which will be made available in the pews.

For your convenience we will offer in-person listening sessions on 3 separate days at varying times as follows: Saturday February 5th (1.30-3.30PM), Monday February 7th (9AM-11AM) & Tuesday February 8th (7PM-9PM). You may choose the day/time that best suits your schedule but will be required to register in advance to participate. More details will be made available in the coming weeks.

The focus questions relating to the synod are as follows:

A Synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together." How is this "journeying together" happening today at Our Lady of Mercy Parish? What steps does the Spirit invite us to take to grow in "journeying together?"

Before responding, you are invited to prayerfully reflect/consider:

- a) What are some of the ways in which Our Lady of Mercy Parish successfully brings people together? What groups or individuals feel excluded? What inhibits our listening with an open mind and heart?
- b) What are some of the difficulties or challenges you have encountered and how can participation at Our Lady of Mercy Parish be strengthened moving forward? What insights have you discerned in the context of participation?
- c) Our mission is to witness the love of God in the midst of the whole human family. How might we better witness to the Gospel especially with those who live in the margins and peripheries of our community. Where is the Holy Spirit calling us to mission and service today? What paths are opening up for our Church?

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.

As we prepared for the Solemnity of Christmas, the Scripture readings inspired all faith-filled stewards to stop and ponder in great awe God's ultimate gift: the gift of His only begotten Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ.
