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From The Pastor's Desk...

What if.....The Transfiguration in today's Gospel was not really about a dramatic, dazzling change in Jesus, but was instead about the radical change that took place in the apostles – that they could see Jesus differently? What if today's Gospel is really about

transfigurations that take place in the lives of people around us, the kinds of changes that make us ask ourselves – Why haven't I made that change, too? What if....this story of transfiguration is really about you and me – and about moments in our lives when God opens our eyes to see the divine within and around us?

Perhaps what today's Gospel is trying to get us to see is that the Transfiguration of Jesus isn't a spectacular special-effects incident that took place a long time ago. It's instead a sweet glimpse of heaven that can come to any of us right now —if we are able to see it. It can happen to a mother when she first views the baby she gave birth to. It can happen to a person reading scripture when suddenly their eyes open wide at words that speak to a deep place within them. It can happen to a person listening to a great symphony or enjoying a walk on a brilliant autumn day or watching the delight of children on a Christmas morning or standing in awe before a masterful piece of art. Transfiguration moments are experience of enchantment that open our everyday mind to the heaven that is already present, if we can see it.

Scripture describes these moments continually. The Acts of the Apostles tells us transfiguration in the awareness that "we live and move and have our being in God." It is the gift of wisdom that Moses received when he went up on a mountain, just like the apostles in today's story, and realized he was "standing on holy ground." What Moses also grasped was that the famous "burning bush" he saw was not an earthen plant on fire, but the gift of vision in his eyes. Like the apostles in today's Gospel, he could see differently. To quote Thomas Merton, "Life is this simple: we are living in a world that is transparent and the divine is shining through it all the time." If we could see it.

Unfortunately, like the apostles in today's Gospel, we are often asleep. Consequently, we tend to miss the clues, the hints, the suggestions of something being afoot that is beyond our everyday recognition, something that is way more than what meets the eye.

This is what Lent is really all about - it's a time to sharpen our inner eyes so that we can better see the "holy ground" in our lives. It's a time to ask: What if? What if I can truly be transfigured?

Have a blessed Lent!

¿Y si... La Transfiguración en el Evangelio de hoy no se tratara realmente de un cambio deslumbrante y dramático en Jesús, sino del cambio radical que tuvo lugar en los apóstoles, que pudieran ver a Jesús de manera diferente? ¿Qué pasa si el Evangelio de hoy es realmente sobre las transfiguraciones que tienen lugar en la vida de las personas que nos rodean, el tipo

de cambios que nos hacen preguntarnos: ¿Por qué no he hecho ese cambio también? ¿Qué pasa si... esta historia de transfiguración es realmente sobre ti y sobre mí, y sobre momentos en nuestras vidas cuando Dios abre nuestros ojos para ver lo divino dentro y alrededor de nosotros?

Quizás lo que el Evangelio de hoy está tratando de hacernos ver es que la Transfiguración de Jesús no es un incidente espectacular de efectos especiales que tuvo lugar hace mucho tiempo. En cambio, es un dulce vistazo del cielo que puede llegar a cualquiera de nosotros ahora mismo, si somos capaces de verlo. Le puede pasar a una madre cuando ve por primera vez al bebé que dio a luz. Puede sucederle a una persona que lee las escrituras cuando de repente sus ojos se abren de par en par ante las palabras que le hablan a un lugar profundo dentro de ellos. Puede sucederle a una persona que escucha una gran sinfonía o disfruta de un paseo en un brillante día de otoño o contempla el deleite de los niños en una mañana de Navidad o se queda asombrada ante una obra de arte magistral.

Los momentos de transfiguración son experiencias de encantamiento que abren nuestra mente cotidiana al cielo que ya está presente, si podemos verlo.

La Escritura describe estos momentos continuamente. Los Hechos de los Apóstoles nos hablan de la transfiguración en la conciencia de que "vivimos, nos movemos y tenemos nuestro ser en Dios". Es el don de la sabiduría que Moisés recibió cuando subió a una montaña, al igual que los apóstoles en la historia de hoy, y se dio cuenta de que estaba "parado en tierra santa". Lo que Moisés también captó fue que la famosa "zarza ardiente" que vio no era una planta de la tierra en llamas, sino el don de la visión en sus ojos. Al igual que los apóstoles en el Evangelio de hoy, el podía ver de otra manera. Para citar a Tomas Merton, "La vida es así de simple: vivimos en un mundo que es transparente y lo divino brilla a través de el todo el tiempo". Si pudiéramos verlo.

Desafortunadamente, como los apóstoles en el Evangelio de hoy, a menudo estamos dormidos. En consecuencia, tendemos a perder las pistas, los indicios, las sugerencias de que algo está en marcha que está más allá de nuestro reconocimiento diario, algo que es mucho más de lo que parece.

De esto se trata realmente la Cuaresma: es un tiempo para agudizar nuestros ojos internos para que podamos ver mejor la "tierra santa" en nuestras vidas. Es un tiempo para preguntar: ¿Qué pasa? ¿Qué pasa si realmente puedo ser transfigurado?

¡Que tengan una bendecida Cuaresma!

Second Sunday of Lent

Gn 15:5-12, 17-18 | Phil 3:17—4:1 or Phil 3:20—4:1 | Lk 9:28b-36

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In today's Gospel from Luke, Jesus is transfigured before the disciples: They see a glorious vision of him wearing dazzling white, with a "face changed in appearance," and conversing with Moses and Elijah about the "exodus that he was going to accomplish in Jerusalem." This is in marked contrast to what Luke had recounted just prior to these verses: Jesus' prediction of his suffering and death, and the assertion that his disciples must take up their crosses daily in order to follow him. So it is no surprise that Peter, likely somewhat stunned after being a part of both moments, "did not know what he was saying." Then a cloud passes over and, while they are frightened, they hear God's voice affirm what they have just seen: "This my chosen Son; listen to him." We all experience these extremes - days where all seems lost; others where we feel as though we've had glimpses of heaven. Today's Gospel encourages us to look to Jesus, who has experienced the frailty of humanity and the glory of divinity. Through his suffering, death, and resurrection, we are redeemed, and ultimately as the disciples glimpsed today - "he will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Life can bring unexpected joys and disappointments. One day we celebrate a birth; another we grieve the loss of a loved one. We fall in love; we experience broken relationships. Many of us may find ourselves in flux much of the time: Will this pandemic ever end? Will the cancer recur? What's next now that the kids are grown? Today's readings give me great hope in the knowledge that God is with us through all the twists and turns and ups and downs of our lives. Just as God fulfilled his promises to Abraham, God has given us a Savior in Jesus Christ and promises that we will someday share in his glory. To that end, we can strive to ensure that no darkness in our world prevents us from becoming a source of light to others. Jesus and the saints walk before us. We pray, then, for the grace to listen to God's chosen Son, and to "stand firm in the Lord."

PRAY Lent is a good time to try a new form of prayer. Do you often pray silently? Try the rosary or spoken prayer. Do you normally pray out loud.? Try centering prayer or another form of quiet or silent prayer, such as *Lectio Divina*.

Health Topic for March

March is *Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month*. Colorectal cancer is cancer of the colon or rectum. In 2022, the American Cancer Society estimates there will be 106,180 new cases of colon cancer and 44,850 cases of rectal cancer. People with a family history of colorectal cancer are at a higher risk and need to be screened earlier than age 45. 68% of deaths from colorectal cancer could be prevented with screening. The earlier the diagnosis of colorectal cancer, the better the survival rate.

Risk factors for colorectal cancer are aging, a personal history of polyps or cancer, inflammatory bowel disease, family history and genetics, smoking, excessive alcohol use, a fatty diet and obesity. Signs and symptoms of colorectal cancer may be an ongoing change in bowel habits, blood in the stool, rectal bleeding, frequent gas pains, bloating, fullness or cramping, weight loss for no known reason or feeling very tired. Please consult with a healthcare practitioner if you have any concerns about colorectal cancer. For more information about colorectal cancer go to FIGHTCRC.ORG.



Lenten Regulations

- 14 years and older is bound to abstain from meat on Fridays.
- 18–60 yrs old are bound to fast on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.
- On Fridays one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, needed to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal.
- To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is sinful.
- During Lent the faithful should draw closer to God through penance, prayer and almsgiving.
- Those who are sick, pregnant or nursing, or whose health would be adversely affected by fasting or abstinence, are not bound by these norms.

Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
