From The Pastor's Desk...

It is a heartfelt joy that I welcome all of you to Easter Sunday Mass! There is no greater celebration for Christians than Easter! It is good that you are here! But for a moment, let us travel back in time to that first Easter morning.

Since the death of Jesus, all who knew and loved him have been laying low. They've been grieving. They've been stunned. They've been trying to retrace the path of events that led them to this horrible and despite all Passion prediction to the contrary unanticipated crisis. Were they wrong to have entered Jerusalem? Was there a fatal mistake that could have been avoided earlier in the plan? Whose fault was it that things turned deadly so quickly? If Jesus foresaw all this, why didn't he prevent it from happening? It's safe to say the friends of Jesus have spent the past 36 hours trying to understand.

Then, the empty tomb is discovered. Mary of Magdala dashes through the dark and reports directly to Peter. Her interpretation? "They – the enemies of Jesus – have stolen his body. Peter runs to the site, sees every detail of the remaining contents of the tomb, but draws no stated conclusions. Another disciple goes with him, "sees" and "believes" - but we aren't told precisely what he saw or what he believed. The evangelist comes to his own bottom line of all this frantic running and bewildered seeing: "They did not yet understand the Scriptures that Jesus had to rise from the dead."

We now have the luxury of 2,000 years of Christianity and a sworn allegiance to this faith in the resurrection. When we hear the story of Easter morning from our vantage point, it's easy to wonder what part of the Resurrection didn't those early believers understand. Empty tomb, stone rolled away, burial cloths neatly piled up.

Ah. If only it were that simple. Many of us run all around the territory of religion, reporting and seeing and believing – but understanding little and incorporating less. Genuine understanding of the empty tomb isn't an "aha!" moment that's over and done with on Easter morning. It's demonstrated in how you perceive every empty, lost, lonely, abandoned situation in this world and in your life. Is it hollow, or full of divine promises?

On behalf of Fr. James, Deacon Tom, our permanent deacons, pastoral and support staff, I wish you and your family a most blessed Easter day and Easter season!

¡Es con alegría sincera que les doy la bienvenida a todos a la Misa del Domingo de Pascua! ¡No hay mayor celebración para los Cristianos que la Pascua! ¡Es bueno que estén aquí! Pero por un momento, viajemos en el tiempo a esa primera mañana de Pascua.

Desde la muerte de Jesús, todos los que lo conocieron y lo amaron han estado postrados. Han estado de duelo. Han quedado atónitos. Han estado tratando de recorrer el camino de los eventos que los llevaron a esta horrible Pasión, a pesar de todas las predicciones a la crisis inesperada. ¿Se equivocaron al entrar en Jerusalén? ¿Hubo un error fatal en el plan que podría haberse evitado antes? ¿De quién fue la culpa de que las cosas se volvieran mortales tan rápido? Si Jesús previó todo esto, ¿por qué no evitó que sucediera? Es seguro decir que los amigos de Jesús han pasado las últimas 36 horas tratando de entender.

Entonces, se descubre la tumba vacía. María de Magdala atraviesa la oscuridad e informa directamente a Pedro. ¿Su interpretación? "Ellos, los enemigos de Jesús, han robado su cuerpo. Pedro corre al sitio, ve todos los detalles del contenido restante de la tumba, pero no saca conclusiones expresadas. Otro discípulo va con él, "ve" y "cree", pero no se nos dice con precisión lo que vio o lo que creyó. El evangelista llega a su propia conclusión de todo este correr frenético y ver desconcertado: "Aún no entendían las Escrituras de que Jesús tenía que resucitar de entre los muertos".

Ahora tenemos el lujo de 2000 años de Cristianismo y una lealtad jurada a esta fe en la resurrección. Cuando escuchamos la historia de la mañana de Pascua desde nuestro punto de vista, es fácil preguntarse qué parte de la Resurrección no entendieron esos primeros creyentes. Tumba vacía, piedra removida, paños funerarios cuidadosamente apilados.

¡Ah! Si sólo fuera así de simple. Muchos de nosotros corremos por todo el territorio de la religión, informando, viendo y creyendo, pero entendiendo poco e incorporando menos. La comprensión genuina de la tumba vacía no es un momento "¡ajá!" que se acabó y se terminó en la mañana de Pascua. Se demuestra en cómo percibes cada situación vacía, perdida, solitaria, abandonada en este mundo y en tu vida. ¿Está hueca o está llena de promesas divinas?

En nombre del Padre James, el Diácono Tom, nuestros diáconos permanentes, personal pastoral y de apoyo, iles deseo a ustedes y sus familias un muy bendecido día de Pascua y temporada de Pascua!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Happy Easter! When I think about Easter when I was a child, I admit that many of my memories are centered more around its symbolic trappings: Fannie Mae Easter eggs and peppermint ice cream, my grandma's table set just so, and unseasonably cold Easter egg hunts. While I may not have yet fully understood the theology of the Resurrection, being at Mass with my family and taking part in the celebratory activities engendered in me the disposition of which the psalmist speaks: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad. Today's readings invite us to see both the secular and the sacred with new eyes. The fact that Jesus took on our humanity, died and rose again give us a glimpse of the joy that awaits. The simple pleasures we experience at Easter and throughout the year hint at what the Lord has in mind for all of us. In the meantime, we can turn to Jesus for encouragement, with the knowledge that God is present in the ordinary and extraordinary people and events in our daily lives.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

After Mary Magdalene discovers the empty tomb, Simon Peter and "the other disciple" (John) don't walk – but run to the tomb. I'm struck by the detailed account that follows. Peter "saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place." The words that follow seem contradictory: "Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead." Their understanding would grow in the hours and days that followed. These early witnesses would then share the Good News of Jesus' resurrection, often at the cost of their own lives, building up the Church that endures today. Like the disciples, we, too, are commissioned to witness to our faith in the risen Jesus, sharing this life-changing reality with others through our words and actions.

PRAY As this Easter season begins, we celebrate Christ's triumph over death, yet mourn that death still comes so violently for so many around the world. Make an extra effort – an extraordinary effort – this week to pray for peace in the world.

Lenten Pruning Leads to Easter Glory April, 2022

Recently, I stopped by a big home improvement store. The garden center was bustling with people shopping for flowers and plants. Happily, I sighed and thought, "Ah, spring is in the air!"

One of my favorite images in the Bible is that ofthe garden. It not only reminds us that we reap what we sow. But also, it all begins in the Gardenof Eden with the creation of Adam and Eve andthen their eventual fall from grace. Jesus experiences deep prayer, agony and betrayal in the Garden of Gethsemane before his crucifixion. At the resurrection, Mary Magdalene is the first to see the risen Christ, but she does not recognize him, "supposing him to be the gardener" (John 20:15). Throughout Scripture, gardens are a place to encounter the mystery of God. They are places of suffering, death and most importantly, new life.

Saying all this, let me acknowledge that I do not have a naturally

green thumb. I admire people who possess that gift. Regardless, I am starting todabble in some basic gardening.

At the bishop's residence in Joliet where I live, Ihave made the decision to have some large trees cut down in my backyard. The reason I am having them removed is not because I am "anti-tree." On the contrary, I love trees. However, there are so many in my backyard, that they have created a canopy over the yard through which no sunlight can penetrate. As a result, instead of grass, my backyard is basically a plot of dirt that, when itrains, turns into a muddy mess and at worst a swamp. As we remove a few of the trees, my hopeis that the sun may shine through the remaining ones and that grass, flowers and plants may return to sprout, grow and flourish.

Scripturally, Jesus reminds us that gardens needto be pruned so that they may produce fruit: "He prunes it so that it may bear more fruit" (John 15:3). In the Catholic Church, spiritual pruning is not a negative exercise. Instead, it helps our spiritual growth by removing whatever inhibits or prevents us from growing in healthy and holy ways.

Perhaps that is a good way to look at these past 40 days. Lent provides us the time to cut down and prune some things in our lives that prevent God's light from shining on and through us. We do so, specifically during Lent, with our acts of penance, prayer and almsgiving.

Continuing this theme of gardening around my house, late last fall I planted over 50 tulip bulbs around the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary. After I planted them, I have constantly wondered, "Did the squirrels dig them up and eat them?" "Will they blossom and what color will they be?" "Will the Blessed Mother enjoy them?" Every find myself eagerly day, 1 awaiting these tulips to colorfully burst through the soil.

This is an act of hope! While I still cannot see the flowers, I eagerly anticipate their arrival. We, too, wait with faith and hope to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and savior at Easter and boldly proclaim that he is not dead. He is not still inthe ground. He is risen!

The lingering question is, "Why do we spend time at garden centers and in our own gardens, planting and caring for flowers and plants?" It is partially because they are tangible signs of beauty, hope and life. As St. Alphonsus Liguori rightly noted, "When we see a beautiful garden, or a beautiful flower, letus think that there we behold a ray of the infinite beauty of God, who has given existence to that object."

As we come to the end of this Lenten time of pruning in our own spiritual gardens, let us approach Easter with great joy and enthusiasm. In other words, with springtime hope, let us continueto search for and bask in the risen life of Christ, for he truly fills our world and lives with light, beauty and new life.

Each beautiful lily in our church not only reminds us of Christ's glorious resurrection, but also represents a special prayer to God for the repose of a soul, help for the living, or a prayer of gratitude for gifts received. The prayers are offered then, not by joust one person, but by everyone who enjoys the look and fragrance of these lovely Easter flowers. Thank you for your faithfulness and generosity.


