

From The Pastor's Desk...

Also Known as Chardonnay W(h)ines!



Today I would like to share with you some thoughts about my last time to preside for the liturgies of the Sacred Triduum. The liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil are in reality one single liturgy over three days. More recently in parishes with more than one priest, it has become

more common to have one of the priests preside for all three days instead of dividing the presiders for the three days. So, for my last time before retiring from parish ministry, I had the privilege to preside for the Sacred Triduum.

Holy Thursday was a step in faith for me. In the past every parish I have been in we selected those to have their foot washed before Holy Thursday, and while we did pre-select two, the Holy Spirit urged me to invite people from the assembly that very evening to come forward for the foot washing. While I got a lot of skeptical feedback from what I was going to do, I had faith in the people of OLM! And boy did you come through! It was so fun and joyful for me to see your response. And when I asked for a young man who might be discerning a vocation to the priesthood, and he came forward, it was truly inspiring to see the assembly's reaction — enthusiastic applause! I had many people say how moved they were, and one woman came to my office, and hugged and thanked me saying she has never been involved in anything in church before, but came forward when I invited those in the assembly. This Holy Thursday liturgy will rank in one of my best memories!

As you know, I am a Vatican II priest, which simply means that I believe the laity have a voice and active role in the church, and we must not always be confined by rubrics. I bet there was no other church in the Diocese of Joliet that celebrated Holy Thursday the way we did! That brings us to Good Friday. In the past, I always remembered that the priests and clergy held the cross for veneration. Once again, why not the laity? It moved me to tears to see just ordinary men, women, and children take turns holding the cross for veneration. Jesus' death and resurrection was for ALL of us — no particular class. Thanks to all who held the cross of veneration!

The Easter Vigil is always the highlight of the year, and this year was no exception. The fire, the many scripture readings, baptizing two adults and two children – one a screamer! – then receiving two adults into the Catholic faith and confirming the four adults and giving them the Body and Blood of Christ for their first time – nothing compares! The whole assembly renewing their baptismal promises, plus the beauty of the flowers and music – it was a little bit of heaven on earth!

Hoy me gustaría compartir con ustedes algunos pensamientos sobre mi última vez de presidir las liturgias del Sagrado Triduo. Las liturgias del Jueves Santo, del Viernes Santo y de la Vigilia Pascual son en realidad una sola liturgia de tres días. Más recientemente, en las parroquias con más de un sacerdote, se ha vuelto muy común que uno de los sa-

cerdotes presida los tres días en lugar de dividir a los que presiden para los tres días. Entonces, por última vez antes de jubilarme del ministerio parroquial, tuve el privilegio de presidir el Triduo Sagrado.

El Jueves Santo fue un paso de fe para mí. En el pasado, en todas las parroquias en las que he estado, seleccionamos a aquellos para lavarles los pies antes del Jueves Santo, y aunque preseleccionamos a dos, el Espíritu Santo me instó a invitar a personas de la asamblea esa misma noche a pasar al frente para el lavado de pies. Si bien recibí muchos comentarios escépticos sobre lo que iba a hacer, itenía fe en la gente de OLM! ¡Y vaya que lo lograste! Fue muy divertido y alegre para mí ver tu respuesta. Y cuando pregunté por un joven que podría estar discerniendo una vocación al sacerdocio, y se presentó, fue realmente inspirador ver la reacción de la concurrencia: ¡un aplauso entusiasta! Muchas personas dijeron lo conmovidas que estaban, y una mujer vino a mi oficina, me abrazó y me agradeció diciendo que nunca antes había estado involucrada en nada en la iglesia, pero se presentó cuando invité a aquellos de la asamblea. Esta liturgia del Jueves Santo figurará en uno de mis mejores recuerdos!

Como saben, soy un sacerdote del Vaticano II, lo que simplemente significa que creo que los laicos tienen una voz y un papel activo en la iglesia, y no siempre debemos estar limitados por rúbricas. ¡Apuesto a que no había otra iglesia en la Diócesis de Joliet que celebrara el Jueves Santo como lo hicimos nosotros! Eso nos lleva al Viernes Santo. En el pasado, siempre recordaba que los sacerdotes y el clero sostenían la cruz para venerarla. Una vez más, ¿por qué no los laicos? Me conmovió hasta las lágrimas ver a hombres, mujeres y niños comunes turnarse para sostener la cruz para la veneración. La muerte y resurrección de Jesús fue para TODOS nosotros, ninguna clase en particular. ¡Gracias a todos los que sostuvieron la cruz de veneración!

La Vigilia Pascual es siempre el punto culminante del año, y este año no fue la excepción. El fuego, las muchas lecturas de las Escrituras, el bautismo de dos adultos y dos niños – juno que grita! – Luego recibir a dos adultos en la fe Católica y confirmar a los cuatro adultos y darles el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo por primera vez – jnada se compara! Toda la asamblea renovando sus promesas bautismales, además de la belleza de las flores y la música – jfue un pedacito de cielo en la tierra! ¡Que tengan una bendecida Temporada de Pascua!

Third Sunday of Easter

Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41 | Rev 5:11-14 | Jn 21:1-19 or 21:1-14

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The accounts of Jesus' appearances to the disciples after his resurrection often puzzle me, and today's reading is no exception. There stands Jesus, within sight, yet the Apostles "did not realize that it was Jesus." Hello?! I know we're in the midst of a daylight saving time debate, but I'm fairly sure "dawn" meant the sun was up. Yet as soon as Jesus speaks and they follow his instructions, they realize he is their Lord. Simon Peter wastes no time; he dives into the sea and makes for the shore. Peter and the disciples show us that while it is important to recognize Jesus, it's what we do next that matters. As we learn in Acts, they boldly say his name despite the Sanhedrin's warning, and most will go on to be martyred for the Church. Thanks to them, we recognize Jesus - in the Eucharist, in Scripture, and in Tradition, and on the crucifixes in our homes and churches. Peter challenges us to "dive in," moving from faith to action. The specifics will differ for each of us, but we can study the lives of the Apostles and the saints to find inspiration.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Is it a Catholic thing or the fact that I'm a closet introvert? I sometimes struggle with talking about Jesus. Which is why today's reading from Acts challenges me. The Sanhedrin had warned the Apostles not to even speak Jesus' name. Yet they don't cower in fear or simply go back to the relatively quiet lives they led before they met Jesus. They rejoice to be found worthy "to suffer dishonor for the sake of [Jesus'] name." Their commitment challenges us to be bold – not only with our words but with our actions as well. In the same way that teaching another person math or spelling helps us learn, witnessing to our faith by sharing it with others helps us deepen our faith and answer God's call to be his disciple, striving to build his kingdom on earth.

STUDY This week, look up the feast days and read about the saint of the day. What can we learn from their example?
