From The Pastor's Desk...

Today we are celebrating the priestly ordination and welcoming back to OLM Fr. Tom Logue. Ordained a priest on May 21, 2022 by Bishop Ronald Hicks, Fr. Tom served a two-year internship at OLM as a seminarian and transitional deacon. We at OLM are honored to have played a role in his formation as a priest,

and we congratulate him and assure him of our prayerful support. Fr. Tom will begin his first priestly assignment on July 1, 2022 at St. Raphael parish in Naperville.

Today we also celebrate Pentecost. Pentecost is a big deal! But what does it mean to us? It is of course all about the Spirit, and today's readings tell us that the Spirit is ready to lead us through transformations every bit as clear and bewildering as the events of Luke's account of the Pentecost event. There are five suggested readings for today's liturgy and the all lead us to reflect on our place in the community of believers. Not one of the readings speaks of a private experience of the Spirit of God, guite the opposite. The communal dimension is most obvious in the selection for 1 Corinthians, in which Paul uses the image of a body to explain how intimately the members of the community have become identified with one another. When Paul speaks of the differing gifts within the body of Christ, he highlights the paradoxical reality that the more unified the people become, the more their personal identity is strengthened. The more they get involved as integral parts of the community, the more their individual gifts are brought out in service to others. We were all given gifts of the spirit at our baptism. May today's celebration of Pentecost strengthen your awareness of your gifts of the Spirit!

This evening, thirty-six people from Our Lady of Mercy and St. Michael in Wheaton will be leaving with me on a flight to Zurich, Switzerland where we will begin a ten-day tour of Central Europe. The highlight of our trip will be attending the world famous Passion Play in Oberammergau, Germany. Scheduled to go in 2020, the trip was postponed until now due to the Coronavirus pandemic. We will see Lucerne, Oberammergau, Munich, Salzburg, and end in Prague. We fly back on June 15. Please pray for our safety.

Hoy celebramos la ordenación sacerdotal y damos la bienvenida de regreso a OLM al Padre Tom Logue. Ordenado como sacerdote el 21 de mayo del 2022 por el Obispo Ronald Hicks, el Padre Tom realizó una pasantía de dos años en OLM como seminarista y diácono de transición. En OLM nos sentimos honrados de haber desempeñado un papel

en su formación como sacerdote, lo felicitamos y le aseguramos nuestro apoyo en oración. El Padre Tom comenzará su primera asignación sacerdotal el 1 de julio del 2022 en la parroquia de St. Raphael en Naperville.

Hoy también celebramos Pentecostés. ¡Pentecostés es una gran cosa! Pero, ¿qué significa para nosotros? Por supuesto, todo se trata del Espíritu, y las lecturas de hoy nos dicen que el Espíritu está listo para guiarnos a través de transformaciones tan claras y desconcertantes como los acontecimientos del relato de Lucas sobre el evento de Pentecostés. Hay cinco lecturas sugeridas para la liturgia de hoy y todas nos llevan a reflexionar sobre nuestro lugar en la comunidad de creyentes. Ninguna de las lecturas habla de una experiencia privada del Espíritu de Dios, todo lo contrario. La dimensión comunitaria es más obvia en la selección de 1 Corintios, en la que Pablo usa la imagen de un cuerpo para explicar cuán íntimamente los miembros de la comunidad se han identificado unos con otros. Cuando Pablo habla de los diferentes dones dentro del cuerpo de Cristo, destaca la realidad paradójica de que cuanto más unidas se vuelven las personas, más se fortalece su identidad personal. Cuanto más se involucren como partes integrales de la comunidad, más sus dones individuales se pondrán al servicio de los demás. Todos recibimos dones del Espíritu en nuestro bautismo. ¡Que la celebración de Pentecostés de hoy fortalezca vuestra conciencia de vuestros dones del Espíritu!

Esta noche, treinta y seis personas de Our Lady of Mercy y St. Michael en Wheaton partirán conmigo en un vuelo a Zúrich, Suiza, donde comenzaremos una gira de diez días por Europa Central. GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Peace be with you." On hearing those four simple words, the fear that had paralyzed the disciples gives way to rejoicing. We, too, can feel paralyzed at times – by fear, yes – but also indecision, conflict, negativity, and perhaps even headlines that remind us how fractured our world has become. Yet here is Jesus, wishing us peace and giving us the gift of Pentecost: our Advocate, the Holy Spirit. As Jesus breathes on the disciples, he confers upon them a Spirit of peace that will allow them to push past their fears and build up the Church. "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." We, too, can turn to the Holy Spirit in times of trouble to help us move forward in faith, sharing peace and reconciliation with those we encounter.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Sometimes after a tiring or stressful day, I head up to my room, kick my feet up, and mindlessly scan social media or whatever other distractions might pop up on my smartphone. A friend read somewhere that doing so amounts to effectively putting your time in the shredder! Today's readings challenge me and all of us to dig deeper. Why not, instead, find a quiet place to pray, asking the Holy Spirit for a refresh as we move into the next part of our day, which is indeed the first minute of the rest of our lives. There's nothing wrong with downtime! But in the Holy Spirit, we can find a source of inspiration, energy, and creativity. As St. Paul writes to the Corinthians, "There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." Just as Jesus sent out the disciples, he sends us out to share our gifts to build up the Church.

PRAY We thank you, God, for the ways your Holy Spirit helps us see your love through the people and world around us. We thank you for the gifts of the Spirit within us and for the gift of your Son, Jesus Christ. Holy Spirit, open our hearts as we listen to your word. We ask this in Christ's name.

How Can We Thank You?

At the time of my ordination on June 7, 1958, little did I realize the love, support, care and friendship of so many Catholic parishioners in the parishes I have served throughout the Diocese of Joliet.

Now after 61 years of priesthood, I still love my ministry, and I thank God that I am able to serve in the Joliet area. When I visit our young priests, I tell them how blessed they should be to touch the hearts and souls of so many of God's people.

I continue to be convinced of the prayers of so many people for their priests, present and former parishioners, religious men and women, retired and infirm priests, parish shut-ins and (the list could go on), sustaining both active and those of us in the senior-priest category (far from retired).

Hopefully, all our priests remain committed to caring for the elderly and infirm, for one day we will likely be in the same position.

As a priest ages, like all of us, we too often need care and special attention. We have retired and senior priests living at St. John Vianney Villa in Naperville and Our Lady of Angels Retirement Home in Joliet. There are also senior priests living on their own. I might add that our St. John Vianney Villa is home to nine priests and is capably administered by the Oblates of the Sacred Heart. We are indeed blessed to have Sister Teresina and Sister Karen Marie making the villa a home for our retired priests.

A significant number of our senior priests assist on a regular basis in parishes celebrating Masses, hearing confessions and filling in on a temporary basis. The assistance also enables priests serving in our parishes to take their vacations and occasionally get away for a little rest and relaxation. Father Dan Stempora, Father Marty Gabel, and Father Tony



Taschetta are out on ministry assignments almost daily, while others fill in as needed. Father Bill O'Shea lives in Chicago and assists at Old St. Patrick's Church and returns often to teach religion at All Saints Catholic Academy in Naperville. Father Charlie Wheeler lives at Ss. Mary & Joseph in Chebanese and is ministering on a daily basis in the Kankakee region. I am blessed to assist at several parishes in Joliet, as well as offering Mass at several retirement and nursing homes in the area.

However, to maintain a quality of life in our "golden" years is where we rely on your continued generous financial help. Your senior priests are well aware of the rising costs of medical care and the ordinary living expenses.

The Father's Day Collection taken up each June for the Fund for Diocesan Infirmed and Elderly Priests is to meet the needs of our diocesan elderly, infirmed and retired priests. This year, that collection will take place at parishes throughout the diocese on Father's Day weekend, June 18-19.

Old age, senior status or whatever you want to call it, is a graced time to encounter God in new and wonderful ways. As we senior priests have more time for prayer, silence and stillness, you – our faithful and loving parishioners of the Diocese of Joliet – are remembered daily in our Masses and other prayers. As we have tried to be Good Shepherds to you over many years, we now appreciate your continued care and financial generosity as we draw closer to the promised reward for all those who have loved and served our God.

All of our senior priests express their deep appreciation and sincere gratitude for your love and tremendous generosity.

Fr. Don and Fr. James **DO NOT** send texts or emails asking for money or gift cards. If you receive a message appearing to be from Fr. Don or Fr. James, please discard it and **DO NOT SEND ANY ELECTRONIC MONETARY AID.**

Several steps you can take if you think you have received a scam email.

Double-check the sender's email address. A spoofed email address often has an extension similar to the legitimate email address. You can outsmart them by looking beyond the name and checking the "from" email address to see if it matches what you know the alleged sender's email to be.

Always verify in person/telephone before sending money or sensitive data. Be suspicious! Make it standard operating procedure to confirm email requests for wire transfer, debit cards, account information or confidential information.
