News from P.I.T. (Pastor in Training)



When discussing our Catholic faith with one of my friends, he'll usually respond, "Wow, you actually believe this?" He says it in jest and sarcasm, as he too is a practicing Catholic. The statement is more to point out where we are in our society when it comes to understanding and living out our faith, as it seems to go against our cultural norms.

Over the last 4 and half weeks of Lent, I have been going to various parishes, schools, and homes to bring people the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and that doesn't include the increased hours of the Sacrament Reconciliation this coming week from 7-8:30PM, Monday through Friday, March 27th-31st offered at our parish.

The Sacrament is a beautiful gift Jesus gave the Church (Jn 20:21-23; 2 Cor 5:11-21), and I've seen the power of the Sacrament through my own vocation. Fr. James has preached on the precept of the Church that a Catholic is required to go to confession at least once a year. One can respond, like my friend, "You actually believe this?" Of course my answer is "Yes" and our Gospel this weekend continues to reveal it.

There are many beautiful insights with the story of raising Lazarus, but I'll point to one in particular. Death was a result of sin, so when Jesus says to the people as Lazarus comes out of the tomb, "Unbind him and let him go," Jesus is revealing his authority to free people not only from death, but sin as well. Jesus desires to do the same in our lives. He desires to call us from death to new life; He desires to free us from sin that binds us. Let us take advantage of this gift the Lord has given us in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Cuando hablo de nuestra fe Católica con uno de mis amigos, el generalmente responde: "Vaya, ¿realmente crees esto?" Lo dice en broma y sarcasmo, ya que él también es un Católico practicante. La declaración es más para señalar dónde estamos en nuestra sociedad cuando se trata de comprender y vivir nuestra fe, ya que parece ir en contra de nuestras normas culturales.

Durante las últimas 4 semanas y media de Cuaresma, he estado yendo a varias parroquias, escuelas y hogares para llevarles a las personas el Sacramento de la Reconciliación, y eso no incluye el aumento de horas del Sacramento de la Reconciliación esta próxima semana de 7:00 a 8:30p.m., de lunes a viernes, del 27 al 31 de marzo ofrecido en nuestra parroquia.

In today's Gospel, we see so clearly the fully human nature of Jesus even in the midst of him revealing his divine nature in raising Lazarus from the dead. On hearing that his friend Lazarus had died, Jesus "wept," and he became "perturbed and deeply troubled." We see his love for Martha and Mary, and the freedom he gives them to love him fully in return, and to expect things of him. Each of them confronts Jesus, exasperated: Had you come earlier, our brother would not have died! Yet in the same breath, they express their faith that Jesus is the resurrection and the life. As we continue our Lenten journey, we can rest assured that Jesus is never far from us and that he understands our human longings, struggles and pain. Like Martha and Mary, we can place our faith in Jesus here, now and for eternity.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The raising of Lazarus foreshadows Christ's death and resurrection and reminds us of God's enduring power over death. That can, at times, seem a small comfort as we confront our own mortality or mourn the loss of those dear to us. Yet, just as Jesus showed his love for Lazarus, Martha and Mary, we, too, can extend our love and support for others in their grief. We can show our love through our simple presence, a thoughtful card or an offer to pray for the deceased person and their family. In these ways, we can strengthen our own faith and that of others. As we hear in today's Gospel, "Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him."



LENTEN GUIDELINES Diocese of Joliet-in-Illinois Fast and Abstinence Regulations

- 1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on *Ash Wednesday* and all the *Fridays of Lent*.
- Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is bound to fast and to abstain on *Ash Wednesday* and *Good Friday*.
- 3. On *Ash Wednesday* and *Good Friday*, only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige.
- 4. To disregard completely the law of fast and abstinence is seriously sinful.
- 5. Lent is the principal season of penance in the Christian year; all, in addition to following the Lenten regulations, are strongly urged to develop and follow a program of voluntary self-denial, serious prayer, and a performance of works of charity and mercy.

Care for Creation Corner

This week we suggest creating a backyard garden or growing vegetables in pots on your patio or deck. Planting a garden is very good for many reasons. It helps you eat more fresh fruits and vegetables. You decide what kinds of fertilizers and pesticides come in contact with your food. It lets you control when to harvest your food. Vegetables that ripen in the garden have more nutrients than some store-bought vegetables that must be picked early. Start simple with one or two vegetables that are easy to grow. And then expand as you become more proficient and knowledgeable. Gardens are good for the environment and us. Gardening can build selfesteem, is good for your heart, boosts Vitamin-D, reduces stress and is a great family activity. Gardening can also be good for our spiritual wellbeing when we experience the wonders of nature God has created. We also become more aware and caring. 


