

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



I think I might have to accept the fact that I don't have a green thumb. In seminary, I kept succulents in my room because they are supposed to be easy plants to care for. For a while, things were going well. But then I decided to water one of the plants, and it died from having too much water. So I decided I would wait until it was clear that the other succulent needed water, but it ended up so dry that it looked almost dead. But when I watered it, the plant ended up dying from too much

water. I don't have any more succulents, but there are some plants in my office here at the parish. I was told I don't have to water them, so they should be safe.

In our culture, we struggle with waiting. We want things to be done as quickly as possible, and we want them to be done as perfectly as possible, and we want all this done yesterday. If we try to apply this to our spiritual life, we will almost inevitably become disappointed. God did not create us perfect, and He typically does not work quickly or instantly in the spiritual life.

Maybe that's why Jesus uses the image of a seed to describe how people receive the Word of God into their lives. We can really only observe the progress of a plant after it has grown; we cannot catch a seed in the act of growing. And this growth only takes place over time. My succulents were so slow in showing progress that I didn't notice a change until it was too late. As today's Gospel says, we all need to strive to become the rich soil which will allow the Word of God to grow deep roots and bear fruit. But this takes time.

What does that look like? The key idea is little by little. In the spiritual life, this means cultivating good habits such as praying every day or joining a ministry or doing the dishes. When we first start doing this, we might not see any difference. But after some time, we hopefully will begin to notice some growth compared to where we started.

As with plants, there are many factors that are outside our control. We can make sure the plant has rich soil, water, and sunlight. But the rest is up to God. The same is true for our spiritual lives. We cannot grow by our own efforts alone but only by God's grace.

Even with this in mind, waiting is still hard. But we know that the One Who sows the seed is faithful and that He wants His Word to take root in our lives and bear fruit even more than we do. If we allow Him to work in our lives on His terms, then we can bear fruit "a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold." Thankfully, God takes much better care of His plants than I do.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Creo que podría tener que aceptar el hecho de que no tengo habilidad para la jardineria. En el seminario, tenía plantas suculentas en mi habitación porque se supone que son plantas fáciles de cuidar. Durante un tiempo, las cosas iban bien. Pero luego decidí regar una de las plantas, y se murió por tener demasiada agua. Así que decidí esperar hasta que quedara claro que la otra suculenta necesitaba agua, pero terminó tan seca que parecía casi muerta. Pero cuando la regué, la planta terminó muriendo por el ex-

ceso de agua. No tengo más suculentas, pero hay algunas plantas en mi oficina aquí en la parroquia. Me dijeron que no tengo que regarlas, así que deberían estar vivas.

En nuestra cultura, luchamos con la espera. Queremos que las cosas se hagan lo más rápido posible, y queremos que se hagan de la manera más perfecta posible, y queremos que todo esto se haga ayer. Si tratamos de aplicar esto a nuestra vida espiritual, casi inevitablemente nos decepcionaremos. Dios no nos creó perfectos, y por lo general El no obra de manera rápida o instantánea en la vida espiritual.

Tal vez por eso Jesús usa la imagen de una semilla para describir cómo las personas reciben la Palabra de Dios en sus vidas. Realmente solo podemos observar el progreso de una planta después de que ha crecido; no podemos agarrar a una semilla en el acto de crecer. Y este crecimiento sólo se produce con el tiempo. Mis suculentas tardaron tanto en mostrar progreso que no noté ningún cambio hasta que fue demasiado tarde. Como dice el Evangelio de hoy, todos debemos esforzarnos para convertirnos en la tierra fértil que permita que la Palabra de Dios eche raíces profundas y dé frutos. Pero esto toma tiempo.

¿Cómo se ve eso? La idea clave es poco a poco. En la vida espiritual, esto significa cultivar buenos hábitos como orar todos los días o unirse a un ministerio o lavar los platos. Cuando comencemos a hacer esto por primera vez, es posible que no veamos ninguna diferencia. Pero después de un tiempo, posiblemente comenzaremos a notar algún crecimiento en comparación con el punto de partida.

Al igual que con las plantas, hay muchos factores que están fuera de nuestro control. Podemos asegurarnos de que la planta tenga tierra fertil, agua y luz solar. Pero el resto depende de Dios. Lo mismo es cierto para nuestra vida espiritual. No podemos crecer solo por nuestros propios esfuerzos, sino solo por la gracia de Dios.

Incluso con esto en mente, la espera sigue siendo difícil. Pero sabemos que Aquel que siembra la semilla es fiel y El quiere que Su Palabra eche raíces en nuestras vidas y dé frutos aún más que nosotros. Si permitimos que Él obre en nuestras vidas en Sus términos, entonces podemos dar fruto "al ciento, al sesenta o al treinta por uno". Afortunadamente, Dios cuida mucho mejor de Sus plantas que yo.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

At Mass with my family recently, my five-year-old daughter caught the last four words of the mystery of faith as if she was hearing them for the first time. She was bursting with excitement as we finished saying, "We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your resurrection, until you come again." She turned to me and said, "Mom! We said, 'until you come again.' Does that mean Jesus is coming back? He's coming HERE?" What a lovely, emotion-filled response to learning that truth. She has heard those words countless times, but this time she heard the truth behind them. Her soul has been made for relationship with God from her time in the womb. The Holy Spirit has been preparing her to receive those words when she was ready to hear them in their fullness, and as the responsorial psalm proclaimed: "The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest." For those in the young, challenging years when it may seem easier to leave the little ones at home rather than take them to Mass, let's remember what we are told in the first reading from Isaiah. "Thus says the Lord: ... my word shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

How often do you find yourself listening to a friend or family member not to really hear what they are saying, but to plan your response? Do we do that while we pray as well? Sometimes I catch myself praying with an inner monologue behind it, deciding how I want that prayer to be answered. Now all of this may not be exactly what Jesus meant when he said, "This is why I speak to them in parables, because they look but do not see and hear but do not listen or understand," but it is worth exploring. When we are so anxious to get our words in – either to another person, or to God, we're not really being the rich soil that the other's words deserve. We're not even the rocky ground or the thorny path of which the Lord speaks; we're more like a giant rubber wall off of which the words bounce! Let's take some time to consider how our practice of listening and receiving others, including the Lord, is preparing us (or not) for the return of Jesus. And if there is room to improve, now is a good time to do it.

PRAY Lord, Jesus Christ, prepare my heart and my soul so that your words and your desires for my life will not fall on rocky soil. Give me the strength to be a Godly sower to all I encounter, especially my family, so your glory will be revealed. Amen.

RECENTLY, I VISITED A
PARISH IN OUR DIOCESE.
Immediately after the Mass, I
was delighted to begin the
"meet and greet" in the
narthex. Per usual, the topics
of conversation were widely
varied. I was struck,
however, by a comment
made by one of the

parishioners. Seemingly out of nowhere, she exhorted me: "Bishop, we are all in need of the month of July!" I think she read the polite—yet confused—look on my face, as she explained, "Life gets so busy and crazy. It seems that July is the only month to slow down, enjoy the warm weather and just chill out!" Nodding with affirmation, I smiled and chuckled as I replied to her, "I think you are right. We all need a little summer in our lives." With that, a huge smile appeared on her face as she raised her hand to give me an enthusiastic high five.

Truth be told, I love the month of July. I have great childhood memories of mid-summer, specifically about Independence Day. Each year on the Fourth of July, my grandma would host an all-day family gathering at her house in Blue Island, Illinois. My uncles would fire up the large, charcoal grills around 7 a.m. After cooking many pounds of bacon, the eggs then were fried in the drippings. But this annual ritual divided the family down the middle—there were about half of us (including me) who viewed this breakfast as one of the greatest culinary delights of the year. The other half would not permit the grill masters to touch their plates, opting instead for kitchen-made eggs and pancakes with some coffee cake and fruit.

After this grand breakfast, the day would be filled with music, conversation, volleyball, croquet, a beanbag toss, and—for some—a walk to Western Avenue to watch the Fourth of July parade. The day concluded by sitting on lawn chairs and blankets as we watched the fireworks from the local high school as we passed around bug repellant to keep the mosquitoes away.

To this day, I still cherish those family memories of the Fourth of July at my grandma's. Instead of work, study, or chores, it was a day to truly disconnect from the obligations of life and simply enjoy a full day of food, fun, family, and friends. And like most of us, I relished a break from work and school.

As we enter fully into this month of July, maybe it is not only time to refresh and recharge our lives with some good food, fun, family and friends. Perhaps summertime also is our opportunity to refresh and recharge our *spiritual* lives.

One way to revive ourselves is to immerse ourselves in God's creation. In contrast to those gray periods of winter, the sun now shines brightly as our days are longer between sunrise and sunset. The flowers are blooming with vivid colors and the canopy of full trees offer coolness and shade. We can open our windows and listen to birds chirp as we bite into garden-fresh tomatoes, peppers, cherries, and watermelon. It is also a time to notice our neighbors, as many people enjoy a morning or evening walk and children ride bikes around the neighborhood.

On the spiritual level, if you find yourself traveling away from home this summer, please do not take a vacation from attending Mass. Instead of looking at it as a way to merely fulfill an obligation, remember that you're participating in and receiving the greatest gift that God has given to us—Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. Attending a different Catholic church also can invigorate us while we experience new congregations, listen to different homilists, and worship with other choirs and musicians.

As Catholics, we are reminded that while we embrace the downtime of summer, there is no need to take a break from God! In fact, it's a wonderful time to invite Jesus Christ into your summer experience. For like I was told in the narthex after Mass, we need the month of July! This is the perfect month to refresh and recharge our spiritual lives.

May you have a happy summer and may God bless and protect you always.

FYI - "Food loss and waste is estimated to be roughly one third of the food intended for human consumption in the United States. When food is discarded, all inputs used in producing, processing, transporting, preparing, and storing discarded food are also wasted. Food loss and waste also exacerbates the climate change crisis with its significant greenhouse gas (GHG) footprint. Production, transportation, and handling of food generate significant Carbon Dioxide (CO2) emissions and when food ends up in landfills, it generates methane, an even more potent greenhouse gas." We will be working on collecting items later in the year for a Welcome to AMERICA Pack for a refugee family. In the past year we were able to present a Welcome Pack with necessary household and personal care items to a family of four from Guatemala and a Welcome Pack and ethnic food pack to a family of five from Myanmar (Burma), and some extra items needed for a large family of six from Ukraine. 
