

News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



When I was about three years old, I was on vacation with my parents and grandparents, and we stopped at a McDonald's. I was excited to explore the Play Place, so I decided to climb to one of the highest points, where there was a tunnel that crossed the entire Play Place. When I got to this tunnel, I looked out the window down at where my parents and grandparents were sitting, and I was too scared to move on. My mom saw this, so without thinking, she went into the Play

Place, climbed all the way up to where I was frozen in fear, and brought me down safely to the ground. My grandparents would often tell me that story, reminding me, "Your mom climbed into the Play Place to get you."

Today we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Mercy, the patronal feast of our parish. But what is mercy? Mercy is love when it comes in contact with evil. In the Old Testament, one of the words for mercy is *rahamim*. It refers to those strong feelings of tenderness and compassion that a mother has for her child.

This is also the kind of mercy that God has for us. When He sees us sunk in the misery of sin, He is not distant from us, but like my mom climbing into the Play Place, He rushes to rescue us. And He doesn't just rescue us by sending someone else to take care of it, but He Himself becomes man and suffers and dies for us so that we can be with Him forever in Heaven.

At this moment of Redemption, Jesus gave us His mother to be our mother also. Just as Mary gave her "yes" to God at the Annunciation, she also gives her "yes" at the Foot of the Cross to God's loving plan of salvation even though it means the death of her Son, showing mercy to the entire human race. And this "yes" does not end there, but she continues to show this mercy to all her children who call on her. The mercy she shows to us always paves the way for us to receive God's mercy.

But for many of us, it can be very difficult to receive mercy because we feel unworthy, or because it is difficult to face our sins. But in spite of this, we need to be open to receive God's mercy like little children because without it, we are helpless. A child does not do anything to earn the love of his or her parents, but simply receives it as a free gift. In the same way, we need to recognize our need for God's mercy, to accept that mercy for the free gift that it is, and to thank God for it. Like my grandparents who reminded me that my mom climbed into the Play Place to get me, we can sing with Mary, "The Lord's mercy is from age to age."

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Cuando tenía unos tres años, yo estaba de vacaciones con mis padres y mis abuelos y paramos en un McDonald's. Tenía muchas ganas de explorar el Lugar de Juegos, así que decidí subir a uno de los puntos más altos, donde había un túnel que cruzaba todo Lugar de Juegos. Cuando llegué a este túnel, miré por la ventana hacia donde estaban sentados mis padres y mis abuelos, y tenía demasiado miedo para seguir adelante. Mi mamá vio esto, así que, sin pensar, entró en el Lugar de Juegos, subió hasta donde yo estaba congelado por el miedo y me bajó

sano y salvo al piso. Mis abuelos a menudo me contaban esa historia y me recordaban: "Tu mamá subió al Lugar de Juegos para buscarte".

Hoy celebramos la Fiesta de Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia, la fiesta patronal de nuestra parroquia. Pero ¿qué es la misericordia? La misericordia es el amor cuando entra en contacto con el mal. En el Antiguo Testamento, una de las palabras para misericordia es rahamim. Se refiere a esos sentimientos fuertes de ternura y compasión que una madre tiene por su hijo.

Este es también el tipo de misericordia que Dios tiene para con nosotros. Cuando nos ve hundidos en la miseria del pecado, no se aleja de nosotros, sino que, como mi mamá sube al Lugar de Juegos, se apresura a rescatarnos. Y Él no sólo nos rescata enviando a otro para que se encargue de ello, sino que Él Mismo se hace hombre y sufre y muere por nosotros para que podamos estar con Él para siempre en el Cielo.

En el momento de la Redención, Jesús nos dio a Su madre para que sea también nuestra madre. Así como María dio su "sí" a Dios en la Anunciación, también da su "sí" al Pie de la Cruz al amoroso plan de salvación de Dios, aunque signifique la muerte de su Hijo, mostrando misericordia a todo el género humano. Y este "sí" no termina ahí, sino que ella continúa mostrando esta misericordia a todos sus hijos que la invocan. La misericordia que ella nos muestra siempre allana el camino para que recibamos la misericordia de Dios.

Pero para muchos de nosotros puede ser muy difícil recibir misericordia porque nos sentimos indignos o porque nos resulta difícil afrontar nuestros pecados. Pero a pesar de esto, debemos estar abiertos a recibir la misericordia de Dios como niños pequeños porque sin ella estamos indefensos. Un niño no hace nada para ganarse el amor de sus padres, sino que simplemente lo recibe como un regalo. De la misma manera, debemos reconocer nuestra necesidad de la misericordia de Dios, aceptar esa misericordia como el don gratuito que es y agradecer a Dios por esto. Como mis abuelos que me recordaron que mi mamá subió al Lugar de Juegos para buscarme, podemos cantar con María: "La misericordia del Señor es de generación en generación".

Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's readings should bring us great joy. They are a reminder that our Lord may have high standards, but he is also "generous in forgiving" and "near to all who call upon him." In the Gospel, we hear the parable of the laborers in the vineyard. Some work all day while others arrive at the last hour. However, all are paid the same. Similarly, we can all receive God's heavenly reward – whether we are faithful Catholics since birth or converts in our final hour. This parable may evoke mixed feelings for those who see themselves as the laborers who have toiled all day and wonder why their reward is not greater. But rather than making us jealous, this parable should make us rejoice: How wonderful that everyone has the opportunity for everlasting life with the Lord! And what great comfort to know that if we falter and lose our way, it is never too late to return to God.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Sometimes, knowing that we are the recipients of God's bountiful mercy, we can be tempted to lead a life focused mostly on worldly pleasures. To paraphrase St. Augustine: Make me holy Lord ... just not yet! Of course we know this isn't the right attitude or approach to life, but it's certainly tempting. Let's return to the message of the Gospel for a moment. Yes, the Lord is generous in giving all the workers the same wage. But perhaps equally as important is that we are called to be workers in the Lord's vineyard, and what an honor and privilege that is! Serving in the Lord's kingdom here on earth is not drudgery; it is life-giving and fills us with God's love and grace. Let us recall the words of St. Paul in today's Letter to the Philippians. Although he longs to "depart this life and be with Christ," he knows that staying here on earth means "fruitful labor for me." Let us also strive to keep our eyes on the Lord and labor in his field for as long as we are able.

PRAY The first reading from Isaiah reminds us that the Lord works in ways we can't understand: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord." Let us ask God this week for the fortitude to reorient our thoughts and ways to his will, not ours, so as to "conduct [ourselves] in a way worthy of the gospel of Christ."

Bishop Hicks' Column



September 2023 1,000 DAYS



RECENTLY, SOME FRIENDS AND I WERE DEBATING if "milleversary" is a real word. I'd never heard of it, but some insisted it is a legitimate word that means 1,000-day anniversary. Some cleverly invented alternatives like "kiloversary," or "k-day."

This summer I celebrated my "milleversary" here in the Diocese of Joliet. September 29 will mark three years since I was installed as your bishop. I still remember my installation Mass as if it were yesterday. It was in the midst of the pandemic. Even though my heart raced with joy and excitement as I walked down the aisle and looked around, I thought to myself, *what strange days these are with the pews only 20 percent filled with masked people.*

After the installation, I spent my first year in deliberate listening mode. I strived to get to know the diocese, the history of the parishes, the nature of the schools, the experiences of the priests and deacons, the presence of the religious men and women, the involvement of the laity, the breadth of ministries, the status of our finances and the source of our donations and resources. Like assembling pieces of a puzzle, I began to form a clearer picture of our diocese that included both the good and the bad.

I quickly realized the expanse of our diocese. With 125 parishes and missions contained in 4,218 square miles within seven counties, our footprint is enormous. Before arriving in Joliet—during my six years as Vicar General in the archdiocese of Chicago—I walked each day to my office in the pastoral center. As a result, I averaged only about 6,000 miles per year using my car. Comparatively, I now drive about 22,000 miles per year.

But I'm certainly not complaining. I am truly most happy when I get out from behind my desk and am out "in the vineyard" with you, the people of God, celebrating our faith and salvation in the Lord Jesus. Though each parish has a unique "personality," they all share the common trait of gracious hospitality. I am deeply moved when I witness the pastoral leadership of our priests, deacons and staff members. I am touched by how much our parishioners love the Lord, the Blessed Mother, your communities of faith and your families.

Naturally, when I first arrived, I had to come to grips with some of the challenges facing our diocese, many of which were caused by the pandemic. These issues included budgetary concerns caused by decreasing attendance and contributions. With ever-shifting demographics, I was made aware of how some parishes and schools are experiencing great growth, while others are in substantial decline.


Two years ago, when I launched our Targeted Restructuring process, my first goal was to reorganize the diocesan offices while embracing a diocesan vision of Catechesis, Evangelization and Faith into Action. Since then, we also have turned our attention to consolidating or closing some specific parishes and schools, so that our diocese will continue to thrive vibrantly and meet the needs of all those we serve.

Through it all, I have emphasized the need to pass our beautiful faith and tradition on to the next generation as we move from maintenance to mission. I want us to intentionally look for every opportunity to bring more people into the Catholic faith—especially young people—as we continue to encourage them to consider a vocation to the priesthood, religious life and the various ministries in the Church. While doing this at the local level, we also have embraced national movements such as the National Eucharistic Revival, as well as the international Synod on Synodality.

As I reflect on these past 1,000+ days and look forward to my fourth year as your bishop, I am anticipating our launch of the year-long commemoration of our diocese's 75th Anniversary. This celebration will give us the opportunity to remember our past, celebrate our present and look forward with hope.

Your presence, prayers and gifts make this a strong and healthy diocese. Thank YOU for making it so easy for me to say constantly, *I feel happy, blessed and grateful here.*




For the Budget Year 2023/24 we have Increased the Parish Sunday goal by 1.3%, to \$31,000/week, to help expand our numerous varied Ministries.
