

News from S.I.T. (Seminarian in Training)



Hello! I am so grateful to have gotten the chance to meet many of you at the parish. For those that I have not gotten the chance to meet, my name is Jonathan Hernandez. I am the seminarian assigned to Our Lady of Mercy by the Diocese. Perhaps you may have noticed that during the summer months this year I was absent. I was asked by my vocations director to stay at our cathedral and do a program called CPE (Clinical Pastoral Experience). This pro-

gram was extremely helpful for my vocation. Through that experience I received the opportunity to serve at a hospice center, a homeless shelter, and bring communion to the sick on a consistent basis. I was able to encounter others' sufferings in different forms and was in a privileged place where I was often let into places of deep suffering. Often faced with a loss of words this summer, I felt the Holy Spirit guiding me in how he wanted me to minister to each person I was with. I felt Christ wanting to heal his sons and daughters.

This summer experience made me realize that I too was suffering in ways that I didn't acknowledge. As a seminarian, I experience a constantly shifting environment. Often, I am bombarded with activities, homework, and responsibilities. This can all be very tiring. While praying with the suffering of Christ, I realized at a heartfelt level that suffering should point outwards. Suffering is part of the human experience, and we weren't meant to take it on all by ourselves. At the minimum, it should be given to Christ. Furthermore, it is when our suffering points outwards that we realize our suffering has a greater meaning. For example, we are called to love our neighbor even though this isn't the easiest thing to do. Our neighbors often hurt us in words and deeds. Scarred by their actions, we can wallow in the injustice, or we can allow ourselves to feel the hurt, bring it to Christ, and try our best to treat them with the love and respect they deserve as people made in the image of God. Even if they do not reciprocate, we are loving as Christ loved.

What I have just described, is made possible only through a life anchored in Christ. It is his grace and his strength that allow us to abide in his vineyard. We hear St. Paul affirm this in the second reading: "I can do all things in him who strengthens me" (Phil 4:13). When we refuse to give our sufferings to God, we are pointed inwards, and this can become a truly dangerous place to be. In the Gospel reading today Jesus compares the Kingdom of Heaven to a wedding feast. As the King came in to meet the guests, there was one who was not dressed properly: "...how is that you came in here without a wedding garment?" (Mt 22:12) May this remind us to put on the life of Christ, configure and unite our thoughts, words, and actions to him. Give him your sufferings, and live for others, so that you might not be caught without a wedding garment!

Noticias del S.I.T. (Seminarista en formación)



iHola! Estoy muy agradecido de haber tenido la oportunidad de conocer a muchos de ustedes en la parroquia. Para aquellos que no he tenido la oportunidad de conocerlos, mi nombre es Jonathan Hernandez. Soy el seminarista asignado a Our Lady of Mercy por la Diócesis. Quizás hayan notado que durante los meses de verano de este año estuve ausente. Mi director de vocaciones me pidió que me quedara en nuestra catedral e hiciera un programa llamado EPC (Experiencia Pastoral Clínica). Este pro-

grama fue de gran ayuda para mi vocación. A través de esa experiencia recibí la oportunidad de servir en un centro para enfermos terminales, un refugio para personas sin hogar y llevar la comunión a los enfermos de manera constante. Pude encontrar el sufrimiento de los demás en diferentes formas y estaba en un lugar privilegiado donde a menudo me dejaban entrar en lugares de profundo sufrimiento. Este verano, a menudo me he enfrentado con la pérdida de palabras, sentí que el Espíritu Santo me guiaba en cómo quería que yo ministrara a cada persona con la que estaba. Sentí a Cristo queriendo sanar a sus hijos e hijas.

Esta experiencia del verano me hizo darme cuenta de que yo también estaba sufriendo de maneras que no reconocía. Como seminarista, experimento un entorno en constante cambio. A menudo me bombardean con actividades, tareas y responsabilidades. Todo esto puede resultar muy agotador. Mientras oraba con el sufrimiento de Cristo, me di cuenta en un nivel más profundo de que el sufrimiento debe apuntar hacia afuera. El sufrimiento es parte de la experiencia humana y no estamos destinados a afrontarlo solos. Como mínimo, debería dársele a Cristo. Además, es cuando nuestro sufrimiento apunta hacia afuera cuando nos damos cuenta de que nuestro sufrimiento tiene un significado mayor. Por ejemplo, estamos llamados a amar a nuestro prójimo, aunque esto no sea lo más fácil de hacer. Nuestros vecinos a menudo nos lastiman con palabras y hechos. Marcados por sus acciones, podemos hundirnos en la injusticia, o podemos permitirnos sentir el dolor, llevárselo a Cristo y hacer todo lo posible para tratarlos con el amor y el respeto que merecen como personas hechas a imagen de Dios. Incluso si no nos corresponden, estamos amando como Cristo amó.

Lo que acabo de describir es posible sólo a través de una vida anclada en Cristo. Es su gracia y su fuerza las que nos permiten permanecer en su viña. Escuchamos a San Pablo afirmar esto en la segunda lectura: "Todo lo puedo unido a aquel que me da fuerza" (Filipenses 4:13). Cuando nos negamos a entregarle nuestros sufrimientos a Dios, nos dirigimos hacia adentro, y esto puede convertirse en un lugar verdaderamente peligroso. En la lectura del Evangelio de hoy, Jesús compara el Reino de los Cielos con un banquete de bodas. Cuando el Rey entró a saludar a los invitados, había uno que no estaba vestido adecuadamente: "... ¿cómo has entrado aquí sin traje de boda?" (Mateo 22:12). Que esto nos recuerde revestirnos de la vida de Cristo, configurar y unir nuestros pensamientos, palabras y acciones a él. ¡Entrégale tus sufrimientos y vive para los demás, para que no te sorprendan sin traje de boda!



Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 25:6-10a | Phil 4:12-14, 19-20 | Mt 22:1-14



I have about 75 first cousins (yes, really!), so I grew up accustomed to large gatherings. "Feasts" in our family were almost an everyday kind of thing. So you can imagine my initial reaction to today's parable: Why would anyone refuse such a grand invitation? Who doesn't love a feast? As we know, however, with parables, Jesus is giving us a message that is deeper than it first appears. Today he uses the image of a wedding feast to explain God's abundant generosity, and the indifference or outright refusal this loving generosity is often met with. Yes, we enjoy sharing food with family and friends, but are we always gracious recipients of *God's* love and bounty? Are we prepared, and properly disposed, to receive it? (Think of the graces we receive in the sacraments, especially confession.) The kingdom of heaven is the banquet to which we are all invited, and too often we can become busy with our material lives and not notice this ongoing invitation. Or we push it out of our minds, or gad about in the wrong garments (of sin, and not grace). Let us open our ears and our hearts to God's loving invitation, strive to be holy people, and share this gift with those around us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We learn from today's readings that the kingdom of heaven can be likened to a sumptuous banquet. Isaiah, in the first reading, says it well, proclaiming, "The Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples a feast of rich food and choice wines." Isaiah then moves from imagery of food to talk about how God will destroy death forever and wipe away all tears. In other words, God has saved his people, and offers us his constant presence and the gift of eternal life. But we must respond to God's generosity in the proper manner so we are prepared to enter the kingdom when the time comes. Making our relationship with Jesus our number one priority will prepare us well to receive and respond to this invitation. From this we will see how our other priorities naturally change and how God always provides. As St. Paul says in his Letter to the Philippians: "My God will fully supply whatever you need, in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus."

ACTION When you get dressed each morning this week, take a look at what you are wearing spiritually, as well as physically. What does the (spiritual) garment look like? Is it appropriate for a wedding feast? Pray the Act of Contrition (and go to confession if necessary), and then make a conscious effort to repair any faults in your spiritual garment: forgive someone or apologize to someone; pray specifically for someone you do not especially care for; spend time in Eucharistic Adoration.









Ministers of Care are trained in the ministry and commissioned by the parish to visit those unable to come to Church to receive Holy Communion. Ministers visit the homebound, those in hospitals, and other care facilities to pray with them, bring the Eucharist and serve as a caring, listening presence. The Ministers of Care Ministry is a visible sign of the presence of the Church in our lives and continues the healing ministry of Jesus Christ.




