

News from P.I.T. (Seminarian in Training)



Hi! For those who have not had the chance to meet me yet, my name is Jonathan. I am a seminarian who has been serving the parish on the weekends while also commuting an hour to Mundelein Seminary on weekdays for my studies. I am thankful to get the opportunity to write this week's bulletin. Furthermore, I am very happy to announce that my full time internship at the parish begins today! I look forward to serving the parish to a fuller extent. Feel free to

approach me and invite me to help you in your parish ministry!

Today's reading from the Gospel of Mark describes Jesus entering the local synagogue and preaching with authority. The response of the people was that of astonishment because this man did not speak as the scribes. He did not support his words by referencing those before him, but spoke with the same authority as the prophets! To emphasize the authority that he possessed, Jesus drives out an unclean spirit from a man.

My attention was drawn to the action of Jesus driving out an unclean spirit, especially in the context of a synagogue. Often, when I teach children or teens preparing to receive the sacraments about the inside of a church, I speak about the sacredness of the space. Christ is truly present in a different way than if you were simply praying in your home. One way we remind ourselves of this reality is through the actions we do with our bodies in that space. We genuflect, make the sign of the cross, and try to respect the sacredness of the space by keeping silent. Thus, the action of Jesus driving out an unclean spirit in what is a sacred space can evoke astonishment!

I would be surprised to hear if many people have had personal experiences of unclean spirits being cast out in church. It is simply not something often experienced, heard about, or reflected upon. However, as today's Gospel brings up, there is the reality that evil can still enter sacred spaces such as our church. What I invite you to consider is that this evil often enters through us. As humans, we aren't perfect, we sin, and this sin over time makes us blind to our own wrongdoings. We may even become inflexible when our faults are pointed out by others. I bring this up not because I desire to see more scrupulosity. No, instead, I desire to see more people set free in the sacrament of confession. You might not have an unclean spirit, but we all are carrying some weight of sin in our hearts. I think today's Gospel reminds us that Jesus desires to cast out all those things that keep us away from him.

With that desire to grow closer to the Lord, I then remind you as well that Ash Wednesday is in a little more than two weeks. I invite you during this time to prepare yourself, and ask in prayer how the Lord is inviting you to grow in your relationship with him. Don't seek to simply mortify the body because you want a physical result. Instead, seek to turn away from sin, and grow in your relationship with God.

Noticias del S.I.T. (Seminarista en formación)



¡Hola! Para aquellos que aún no han tenido la oportunidad de conocerme, mi nombre es Jonathan. Soy un seminarista que ha estado sirviendo en la parroquia los fines de semana y al mismo tiempo viajo una hora al Seminario de Mundelein los días de semana para mis estudios. Estoy agradecido de tener la oportunidad de escribir en el boletín de esta semana. Además, jestoy muy feliz de anunciar que hoy comienza mi pasantía a tiempo completo en la parroquia! Espero poder servir a la parroquia en la mayor medida. ¡No

duden en acercarse a mí e invitarme a ayudarlos en su ministerio parroquial!

La lectura de hoy del Evangelio de Marcos describe a Jesús entrando a la sinagoga local y predicando con autoridad. La respuesta del pueblo fue de asombro porque este hombre no hablaba como los escribas. ¡Él no sostenía sus palabras haciendo referencia a los que le precedían, sino que hablaba con la misma autoridad que los profetas! Para enfatizar la autoridad que poseía, Jesús expulsa un espíritu inmundo de un hombre.

Me llamó la atención la acción de Jesús expulsando un espíritu inmundo, especialmente en el contexto de una sinagoga. A menudo, cuando enseño a niños o adolescentes que se preparan para recibir los sacramentos, acerca del interior de una iglesia, hablo del carácter sagrado del espacio. Cristo está verdaderamente presente de una manera diferente que si simplemente estuvieras orando en tu casa. Una forma de recordarnos esta realidad es a través de las acciones que realizamos con nuestros cuerpos en ese espacio. Hacemos una genuflexión, hacemos la señal de la cruz y tratamos de respetar el carácter sagrado del espacio guardando silencio. ¡Así, la acción de Jesús expulsando un espíritu inmundo en lo que es un espacio sagrado puede causar asombro!

Me sorprendería saber si muchas personas han tenido experiencias personales de espíritus inmundos expulsados de la iglesia. Simplemente no es algo que se experimente, se escuche o se reflexione con frecuencia. Sin embargo, como lo plantea el Evangelio de hoy, existe la realidad de que el mal todavía puede entrar en espacios sagrados como nuestra iglesia. Lo que les invito a considerar es que muchas veces este mal entra a través de nosotros. Como seres humanos, no somos perfectos, pecamos y este pecado con el tiempo nos vuelve ciegos a nuestras propias malas acciones. Incluso podemos volvernos inflexibles cuando otros señalan nuestras faltas. Menciono esto no porque desee ver más escrupulosidad. No, en cambio, deseo ver más personas liberadas en el sacramento de la confesión. Puede que no tengas un espíritu inmundo, pero todos llevamos algún peso de pecado en nuestros corazones. Creo que el Evangelio de hoy nos recuerda que Jesús desea expulsar todas aquellas cosas que nos mantienen alejados de él.

Con ese deseo de acercarnos más al Señor, les recuerdo también que dentro de poco más de dos semanas será el Miércoles de Ceniza. Te invito durante este tiempo a prepararte y preguntar en oración cómo el Señor te está invitando a crecer en tu relación con él. No busques simplemente mortificar el cuerpo porque quieres un resultado físico. En lugar de eso, busca alejarte del pecado y crecer en tu relación con Dios.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Oh, to not be anxious! What would that be like - to not have to worry about how we'll pay the bills or whether our kids are safe or if our health will fail? While anxiety is a very human emotion, we can take comfort in knowing that our God is more powerful than anything that may worry us. It is also important to note that in today's reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, what he means by "anxious" is not a modern psychological concept with only a negative connotation. The connotation is more "to be concerned with," or "caring about" something, and can refer to things that are very good - including spouses and families! But when we care for many things, including our relationship with God, it is only natural for us to be anxious at times. But Jesus Christ gives us the assurance that the troubles of this world are temporary, and the peace of God eternal. Paul is encouraging the Corinthians, and us, to understand the importance of an undivided devotion to God, to care for him above all things - no matter if we are married or single - so that our whole life is devoted to holiness.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I am always thankful when something good that has been anticipated, or predicted, comes to pass: The sunshine and mild weather holds true for that outdoor event I hosted; or the generous gift that a longtime friend mailed arrives unscathed. There is some anxiety in the waiting for, but relief in the fulfillment of, these beneficent promises. And while these are somewhat superficial examples, they do point us in the same direction of hope and gratitude that the divine gifts of God elicit in us. In today's first reading, Moses promises the people that the Lord will raise up for them, from among their own kin, a prophet who will speak God's own words and to whom the people will listen. And the Lord did provide numerous prophets, and kings, and judges, and eventually his only begotten Son, to call his people back to himself, and to save them from the wages of sin and death. The hope and anticipation God's chosen people had was fulfilled in Jesus' life, death and resurrection. We share in that gift of hope and of gratitude for our salvation.

PRAY Today's psalm (Ps 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9) is a beautiful prayer of thanksgiving and encouragement. It helps us steer our minds from those things which may make us anxious. Spend time in the morning or evening each day of the coming week, praying and reflecting on the words.

BENEFITS OF A PAPER CALENDAR IN THE DIGITAL AGE

calendar that automatically syncs with my phone. Admittedly, the digital calendar is much more convenient and efficient, and once I made the move, I had no regrets. Yet, I still miss some of the nuances of using a paper calendar.

One thing I miss about writing an event down is the ability to impress my friends or family by telling them that I'm going to write down our appointment "in ink" — a nod to the importance and value of our upcoming gathering. I also miss the act of flipping through the pages of a physical calendar, as it evokes so many memories and emotions. Esthetically, a paper calendar — especially those that hang on the wall — also provides a wide array of styles to display, like artwork, in our homes and offices.






DisABILITIES Mass
