News from P.I.T. (Priest in Training)



Recently, my fellow priests and I were sharing our experiences of Ordination with some of the men preparing to be ordained deacons. For many of them, the experience of preparing for diaconate was more daunting than preparing for priesthood because this was the first time we made the promises of celibacy, obedience, and praying Liturgy of the Hours. I remembered being relatively calm as I prepared for the diaconate. But as I reflected more after the fact, I remembered that I hadn't been calm in the months leading up to Ordination.

During my retreat in preparation for Ordination, all my apprehensions about the diaconate came to the surface. I knew my faults better than anyone. How could someone like me become a deacon? When I shared my doubts with the retreat director, he reminded me that there was Someone Who knew me better than I knew myself, and that He was the one calling me to priesthood. I only had myself, with all my sins and wounds, and so I offered that to Him for Ordination.

When we consider Jesus' Passion, we probably remember His strength and serenity in the face of brutal torture. But in this weekend's readings, we hear that as Jesus approached death, "he offered prayers and supplications with loud cries and tears." In the Gospel, Jesus even says, "I am troubled now." Just as we will see later in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus experiences the human desire to avoid death. In spite of this, He still says yes to His Passion. How can we possibly imitate Him?

Jesus reminds us, "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." As we come face to face with our own individual crosses, we see our fears, our sins, and our weakness, and everything in us cries out to the Father to take it from us.

In this moment, we are faced with the choice to rely on self or to rely on God. When we give into the temptation to rely on self, we reject the Cross because we don't think we can bear it. But Jesus teaches us to rely on God when He says, "Father, glorify your name." He places all His trust in the Father's plan, believing that the Cross is for the salvation of the world, and the Father will save Him from death.

As we confront the cross destined for each one of us, we confront our own inadequacy before it, but we also realize our need to rely on God, believing that it is through the Cross that we will bear fruit, through the Cross we will reach the Resurrection. I'm grateful that I experienced those moments of fear and doubt before my Ordination because they gave me the opportunity to see that it was God Who was calling me to priesthood and to rely on Him rather than myself to bear fruit.

Noticias del P.I.T. (Sacerdote en formación)



Recientemente, mis compañeros sacerdotes y yo estábamos compartiendo nuestras experiencias de Ordenación con algunos de los hombres que se preparaban para ser ordenados diáconos. Para muchos de ellos, la experiencia de prepararse para el diaconado fue más desalentadora que prepararse para el sacerdocio porque era la primera vez que hacíamos las promesas de celibato, obediencia y oración de la Liturgia de las Horas. Recuerdo haber estado relativamente tranquilo mientras me preparaba para el diaconado. Pero al reflexionar más después del hecho, recordé que no había estado tranquilo en los meses previos a la Ordenación.

Durante mi retiro de preparación para la Ordenación, todos mis temores sobre el diaconado salieron a la superficie. Conocía mis defectos mejor que nadie. ¿Cómo podría alguien como yo convertirse en diácono? Cuando compartí mis dudas con el director del retiro, él me recordó que había Alguien que me conocía mejor que yo mismo y que Él era quien me llamaba al sacerdocio. Sólo me tenía a mí mismo, con todos mis pecados y heridas, y por eso se lo ofrecí a Él para la Ordenación.

Cuando consideramos la Pasión de Jesús, probablemente recordamos Su fortaleza y serenidad ante la brutal tortura. Pero en las lecturas de este fin de semana escuchamos que cuando Jesús se acercaba a la muerte, "ofreció oraciones y súplicas con fuertes voces y lágrimas". En el Evangelio, Jesús incluso dice: "Ahora que tengo miedo". Así como veremos más adelante en el Huerto de Getsemaní, Jesús experimenta el deseo humano de evitar la muerte. A pesar de ello, Él todavía dice sí a Su Pasión. ¿Cómo podemos imitarlo?

Jesús nos recuerda que, "si el grano de trigo, sembrado en la tierra, no muere, queda infecundo; pero si muere, producirá mucho fruto". Cuando nos enfrentamos cara a cara con nuestras propias cruces individuales, vemos nuestros miedos, nuestros pecados y nuestra debilidad, y todo en nosotros clama al Padre que nos lo quite.

En este momento, nos enfrentamos a la elección de confiar en nosotros mismos o confiar en Dios. Cuando cedemos a la tentación de confiar en nosotros mismos, rechazamos la Cruz porque no creemos que podamos soportarla. Pero Jesús nos enseña a confiar en Dios cuando Él dice: "Padre, glorifica tu nombre". Él pone toda Su confianza en el plan del Padre, creyendo que la Cruz es para la salvación del mundo y el Padre lo salvará de la muerte.

Al afrontar la cruz destinada a cada uno de nosotros, nos enfrentamos a nuestra propia insuficiencia ante ella, pero también nos damos cuenta de nuestra necesidad de confiar en Dios, creyendo que es a través de la Cruz que daremos fruto, a través de la Cruz alcanzaremos la Resurrección. Estoy agradecido de haber experimentado esos momentos de miedo y duda antes de mi Ordenación porque me dieron la oportunidad de ver que era Dios quien me estaba llamando al sacerdocio y de confiar en Él, en lugar de en mí mismo, para dar frutos.



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As we quickly approach Easter, we're reminded of the reason why we are celebrating. God's chosen people stumbled quite a bit throughout the Old Testament, so God intervened time, and time, and time again to set them back on the straight and narrow. Whereas we would likely give up on someone over time, God has remained steadfast in his grace, and always will. He created a new covenant with Israel that wrote his law upon the hearts of Jews and Gentiles alike. This new covenant was realized through Jesus Christ, who was born into our flesh and crucified on the cross. He suffered death in perfect obedience to God the Father. By being born into flesh, Jesus united humanity and divinity; through his crucifixion and resurrection, Christ "became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him." He is the law of love that lives within us, and through him "all, from least to greatest, shall know [the Father.]"

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Jesus didn't suffer the cross for his sake or for his own glory. No, our Savior came to preach the kingdom of heaven to us before sacrificing himself for our sins. Notice how in today's Gospel he even admitted he was troubled! It can be terrifying to do God's will for our lives, and Christ himself was troubled by what he was called to do. Yet, in love and trust in the Father, Jesus was obedient, saying "but it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name." All Christians are called to a life of self-sacrifice, each to the degree it serves God's purpose. We are all called to give up our lives for the sake of love to glorify God. Without Christ's sacrifice, we would not have been saved; without our willingness to pursue God's call upon our life, the kingdom of God cannot be realized on this earth.

REFLECT The Lord placed his law upon your heart the moment you were conceived, but how do you allow him to shine through your life? How do you serve and glorify the Lord? Take a moment today to reflect on your words and actions and consider how you show the world that God is Lord over your life for all time, not only during Lent.

Donations may be dropped off before and after the 4:00 mass on Saturday and on Sunday until noon. No early drop off's please.





Divine Mercy Feast Day Sunday, April 7 at 2 pm



In honor of the Feast Day of Divine Mercy on Sunday, April 7, Our Lady of Mercy will hold a beautiful celebratory service in the Church starting at 2 p.m. Our service will include a group recitation in song of The Chaplet of Divine Mercy, a devotional prayer that Jesus revealed among His numerous apparitions to Saint Maria Faustina. Jesus also made what is famously known among the faithful as His 'Extraordinary Promise':

"On that (Feast) Day, the depths of My mercy will be open to all The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment."

Our OLM observance of the Divine Mercy Feast Day will include the following:

Sacrament of Reconciliation, hours TBA.

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Eucharistic Adoration starting at 2 p.m.

Period of Silent Meditation and Prayer

Placing Divine Mercy Images at the steps of the altar for blessing (images should be placed at the altar steps before 1:45 p.m.)

Taking of Personal Intentions for the Divine Mercy Chaplet Recitation of the Chaplet in song at 3 p.m. (the Hour of Death) Blessing of participants' Divine Mercy Images at the altar Benediction, closing prayers to Jesus and Mary

A program and assorted pamphlets featuring the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, as well as other resources, will be available, but participants should be sure to bring their Rosary!

*Also, on Good Friday morning (March 29th), immediately after an 8 a.m. prayer service in the Church, the Divine Mercy Chaplet will be recited. It's a great way to start your Good Friday observance and your Divine Mercy Novena, which should include your recitation of the Chaplet and a Spiritual or Corporal Work of Mercy.


